Dallas—Five new irrigated pastures are being started in the Grande Ronde community of Polk county this fall, the irrigated tracts totalling 21 acres in all. Owners of these fields are W. W. Against a background of New York's towering skyscrapers stands this tree in Central Park as a living monument to Joyce Kilmer, author of the immortal poem, "Trees." It was brought from its original home 40 miles away and replanted with appropriate ceremonies in that part of Central Park where statues and tablets do honor to other poets. The tree is the gift of Martin L. Davey, former congressman and head of the Davey Institute of Tree Surgery, Kent, Ohio, who has been asked by the Joyce Kilmer Foundation to create an endowment which will guarantee care of the tree so long as it lives. Later in the year dedication exercises will be held by the Kilmer Foundation.

HOT OYSTER BISCUITS

Hot oyster biscuits make a tasty luncheon or Sunday night supper dish. Prepare a biscuit dough in the usual way and roll a quarter of an inch thick; cut into rounds, two inches in diameter. Drain medium-sized oysters well and wipe dry; dip each in melted butter and place on rounds of biscuit dough, using one or more oysters, according to their size. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and paprika, cover with rounds of biscuit dough, brush with milk and bake in a very hot oven. These biscuits are very nice served with a substantial vegetable salad.
