Hallowe'en Dainties

CHILDREN expect to duck for apples on Hallowe'en, and perhaps more grownups are children at heart than many realize. Ducking for apples and other Hallowe'en games are appreciated by most adults, and the wise hostess need never fear suggesting such things on this day of witches and goblins.



Precede or follow the games with a delicious Hallowe'en dinner, and you will be voted a perfect hostess. Here are a few suggestions for Hallowe'en:

Goblins

1 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups sugar
3 eggs beaten
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
5 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons grated orange rind
6 tablespoons orange juice
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1 egg yolk beaten
sifted powdered sugar
Orange vegetable coloring

Cream shortening and 1 1/2 cups sugar. Add 3 eggs beaten, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, grated lemon rind, flour and salt. Roll very thin. Cut into rounds. Bake in a quick oven (425° F.) until delicately browned. Make an icing by mixing grated orange rind, orange juice, 2 teaspoons lemon juice, 2 beaten egg yolks with sifted powdered sugar to spread. Color with a bit of orange vegetable coloring. Draw goblin faces on cookies with melted chocolate. This makes 7 to 8 dozen goblins. If more icing is needed

make icing recipe again using half quantities. This orange icing may be used to ice doughnuts served at a Hallowe'en party.

Chocolate Marshmallow Sundae

1 package chocolate junket
1 pint milk
marshmallow topping
Prepare junket according to directions on package. When just ready to serve add 1 heaping tablespoon of marshmallow topping to each dessert.

Hallowe'en Surprise

(Serves 6-8)
1 cup orange juice
1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind
1 cup water
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup butter
5 to 8 sweet potatoes
Marshmallows

Cut tops off oranges, about 1/4 way down. Extract juice carefully so that shells remain intact. Remove any pulp remaining in shell. Combine orange juice, rind, water, sugar, salt and butter and pour over peeled uncooked sweet potatoes arranged in baking dish. Bake covered in a moderate oven (375°-400° F.) until tender, 30 to 40 minutes. Baste occasionally. When done, beat up with a fork. Pile into orange shells. Top each shell with a marshmallow. Return to oven to brown marshmallows. Serve at once with meat course.

A Coddling Tart

This recipe for apple tarts is taken from the manuscript cook book used by Martha Washington at Mount Vernon.

First coddle (boil or stew) ye apples in faire water, yn take halfe the weight in sugar to make as much syrrope as will cover ye bottom of yr preserving pan, & ye rest of ye sugar keepe to throw on them as they boyle, which must be very softly and you must turne them often lest they burne too. Then put them in a thin tart crust, & give them their syrrope halfe an hour's baking (or, if you please, you may serve them up in a bundishoon dish only garnished with sugar and cinnamon).—Martha Washington.

ON OREGON FARMS

Lakeview—Seven or eight Lakeview farmers who co-operated with County Agent Victor Johnson in planting 675 acres of spring rye for hay in the bed of the Thompson valley reservoir near Silver Lake this spring obtained a yield of nearly 600 tons of hay. This proved a

life-saver, according to Johnson, because of the drought conditions in that area this year.

Dallas—Byron Ruddell of the Oak Point district north of Independence has 85 acres in alfalfa—probably the largest alfalfa field in all western Oregon, according to J. R. Beck, county agent. The field was seeded in 1930 and has produced an excellent stand.
