## Beaverton Team Beats Game Friday

Beaverton Kicks to Gresham, Gets Ball On Fumble, and Scores

### WRIGHT DOESN'T PLAY

Wisner Is Shifted to Quarter, Hart to Full and Emmons to Tackle

Friday of last week, the Beaverton squad took the Gresham aggregation into camp to the tune of 19-6. The field was muddy, the going slippery, the ball like the proverbial greased pig. Taken all in all, the game was not so thrilling as some that have been played on the home field.

Beaverton kicked off to Gresham who picked the ball up and tried to bring it back, but were stopped inside their 20-yard line. One try and then a fumble gave Beaverton the ball. They lost no time in getting it over the goal line on their first play. Seemed to get the visitors' goat.

Two other touchdowns came before the third quarter was ended and it surely looked bad for the visitors. But they bucked up and began to make gains. Coach Warren had sent in a number of substitutes, which accounts for these gains. A 25-yard end run carried the ball almost over Beaverton's goal line and three plays later the oval rusted across the line after persistent line smashes by the visitors. But their punch had ended. The Beaverton squad played a much better defensive game as soon as their opponents scored.

Four or five of the team playing in new positions, the absence of Captain Wright, the shifting of Wisner to quarter, Hart to full, and Emmons to tackle are but a few things which kept the Beaverton boys from playing their usual brilliant game. Their line smashes were pretty good, their end runs were rather well carried out, but by no means up to their usual form.

### SHERWOOD POTATO SHOW TO BE HELD

Potatoes, onions, corn, squash, pumpkins and general farm exhibits have all been provided for by the management of the Sherwood Potato show November 20 and 21. E. D. Hosmer and his committee with W. F. Cyrus, county agent, have just completed the preliminary arrangements. Commercial Burbanks, Netteed Gems, Miscellaneous varieties, certified Burbanks, Gems, and other varieties have been provided for. There is also a class for 4-H club members, and a special class for exhibitors who have never won a prize on potatoes. The best twelve hills of potatoes will receive a premium. Entries in this class will be dug by the show committee.

Growers of yellow, white, and red dent field corn will all have an opportunity to win the ribbons in their respective classes. The Citizens Bank of Sherwood has contributed the cash prizes for the best farm display. Canned goods will not be considered a part of such exhibits. All entries are expected to be in place by noon of Friday, November 20.

Potato grading will be the important feature of the meeting of potato growers scheduled for the afternoon of Saturday during the show. E. R. Jackman, of the State college extension service, will be present to discuss grades and grading. Henry Taube, potato inspector, will also be there to take part in the meeting. Results will be presented from some field trials conducted the past season in which several lots of seed were grown that had been stored under widely different conditions.

## Council Busy On The Problems Of The Town

Decision Is Made To Have  
6 Councilmen, Rather  
Than 4 as at Present

### WATER LEAK FIXED

S. Haas asks to be Granted Con-  
tract to Haul City Garbage

This week the Council have been busy. Monday evening there was a session at the City Hall when several matters of importance were taken up. Perhaps one of the more significant and far-reaching was the decision to have six members on the Council instead of only four. This action was taken after consideration lasting over a considerable period of time.

The Oregon laws have contained a provision for a number of years that a town council should consist of six members. This has been impressed on the present Council through consultations held with the Deputy State Treasurer, Fred Paulus, who is said to be an attorney, with a reputation for thorough work along the lines of the financial status of municipalities. Beaverton's charter also provides that the council shall consist of six members as soon as the census reports a certain population.

The two extra councilmen will be nominated at the coming Town Caucus, one to hold office for one year and one for two years, thus providing that one-half of the councilmen shall be elected each year.

S. Haas was at the meeting to see about a contract for hauling the garbage. He was informed that as soon as the lease on the garbage dump was signed, he would be notified and some action taken at that time.

Mrs. Jos. Miller's bill for laying tile on private initiative along First street was turned down.

The Recorder was instructed to write the Oregon Electric Co. in regard to an open ditch under that company's tracks along East Broadway, and about another opening along Lombard street.

They also voted to supply an 8-inch culvert to go in at a crossing on Eighth street where some of the property owners are making improvement in the way of placing rock on the street.

The leaks in the water system came in for consideration and ways and means were discussed for finding and stopping the loss of water from the mains.

Since the Council met one big leak has been discovered near the Watson and Front street intersection. The "T" going to the hydrant at that corner was leaking badly, but has been repaired.

## Subject Is Announced For Essay Contest

"Doctor John McLoughlin"  
Is the Title Chosen By  
Historical Society

### RULES ARE GIVEN

Essays Must Be Turned In On Or  
Before March 16, 1932

The Oregon Historical Society has selected "Doctor John McLoughlin" as the subject for the 1932 C. C. Beekman History Prizes and Medals. The prizes are four in number, viz., first, sixty dollars; second, fifty dollars; third, forty dollars; and fourth, thirty dollars. They will be awarded for the best four original essays on the above named subject written and submitted by girls or boys over fifteen years of age and under eighteen years of age, attending any public or private educational institution within the State of Oregon. Each of the four prize winners will also receive a handsome bronze medal.

The conditions governing the competition must not exceed two thousand words in length.

(2) The essay may be in handwriting or in typewritten form, preferably upon paper of commercial letter size, either ruled or unruled, the several sheets being numbered consecutively and written on one side only, with blank space of about one and one-quarter inches at top and left-hand margin.

(3) The essay shall be accompanied by a separate sheet containing the name and post office address of the writer, the date of his or her birth, and the name of the school attended.

(4) There shall also be delivered with the essay a certificate signed by a teacher or instructor of the educational institution attended stating that the writer of the essay is a pupil or student attending it.

(5) In order to be considered in competition the essay must be delivered, by mail or in person, to the Oregon Historical Society, Room C, Public Auditorium, 253 Market St., Portland, Oregon, not later than March 16, 1932.

(6) All essays submitted in competition will be numbered and submitted, without the names of the writers or other identifying marks, to three judges selected by the committee. B. B. Beekman, Leslie M. Scott, and George H. Himes.

(7) All competitive essays will be judged according to their general merit and excellence; but the judges will also take into consideration in passing thereon neatness of manuscript, accurate orthography, correct grammar and composition, and purity and clarity of diction.

### HENRY GERIG IS IN- JURED BY TRACTOR

Henry Gerig, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Gerig of Pratum, and a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. August H. Dallmann of Kinton, had a narrow escape from fatal injury recently.

He was disking on a hillside, and the tractor he was driving tipped over, pinning him underneath. After remaining there for half an hour, he was rescued by a group of boys from a school bus which was stopped by a man who had been working nearby.

At last report young Gerig was doing as well as could be expected. There were no bones broken, but he was badly cut and bruised.
