

Taxpayers Meet To Discuss Budget

Resolution Presented By
Tax Payers' League Is
Adopted At Meeting

REDUCTION IS MADE

Doy Gray Opens Meeting; Charles
Haynes Is Named As Chairman

The Washington County Budget meeting convened in the County Court room at ten o'clock Monday morning, December 28. Doy Gray of Beaverton called the meeting to order. Chas. S. Haynes of Middleton was nominated and elected as chairman of the meeting. Judge Templeton's name was placed in nomination by Reverend Holmes of Forest Grove, but the Judge declined to be a candidate. E. C. Luce was then elected secretary.

At once a motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting to the more commodious quarters of the Hillsboro Union high school auditorium. This motion was duly carried and the meeting called there as soon as the chairman and secretary arrived.

The first motion to come up then was to dispense with the reading of the complete budget, and consider the items singly, but after a little discussion this motion was withdrawn. W. J. McCready arose and made a few recommendations. A resolution was read purporting to come from the Washington County Tax League. On the conclusion of the reading of this resolution a motion was made that it be adopted. The motion was duly seconded, and carried. The meeting then adjourned.

Herewith is the text of the resolution adopted:

At a meeting of the Committee, representing the Tax Payers' League of Washington County, on the evening of December 21, 1931, for the purpose of studying the proposed budget of Washington County, Oregon, for the year 1932, which budget is to be submitted on the 28th day of December, 1931, at the hour of 10 A. M. at a public hearing in the Court House in Hillsboro, Washington County, Oregon, at which meeting the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, the Budget Committee has already cut from the 1931 budget considerable reductions, and

Whereas we are of the opinion that the following reductions can be made without in any wise destroying the efficiency of the County government, and that it would be to the best interest of the tax payers of Washington County that further reductions be made as follows:

Commissioners' Court

First Commissioner's time be limited to 12 days per month.

Second Commissioner's time be limited to 12 days per month.

County Recorder

That the appropriation for the Assistant Deputy's salary of \$900.00 be discontinued.

Miscellaneous

That the appropriation for the emergency item be reduced from \$25,000.00 to \$15,000.00.

County Road Budget

1. That the item of bridges, construction and maintenance purchases be reduced from \$45,000.00 to \$30,000.00.

2. The item of right of way be reduced from \$50,000.00 to \$20,000.00.

3. The item of repair upkeep, and minor replacements be reduced from \$18,000.00 to \$10,000.00.

4. The item of labor and grading, crushing and hauling rock maintenance be reduced from \$59,000.00 to \$40,000.00.

5. The item of labor unemployed co-operating with State Highway Commission \$20,000.00 be eliminated.

6. The item of material and supplies be reduced from \$40,500.00 to \$30,000.00.

7. The item rock crusher Supervision be reduced from \$4,000.00 to \$2,000.00.

8. The item of shop foreman be

if we could get a couple hundred yards of good sidewalk for our fair city. If we could dress up the town a little and get some more good people to move in here, and get a new water supply—"

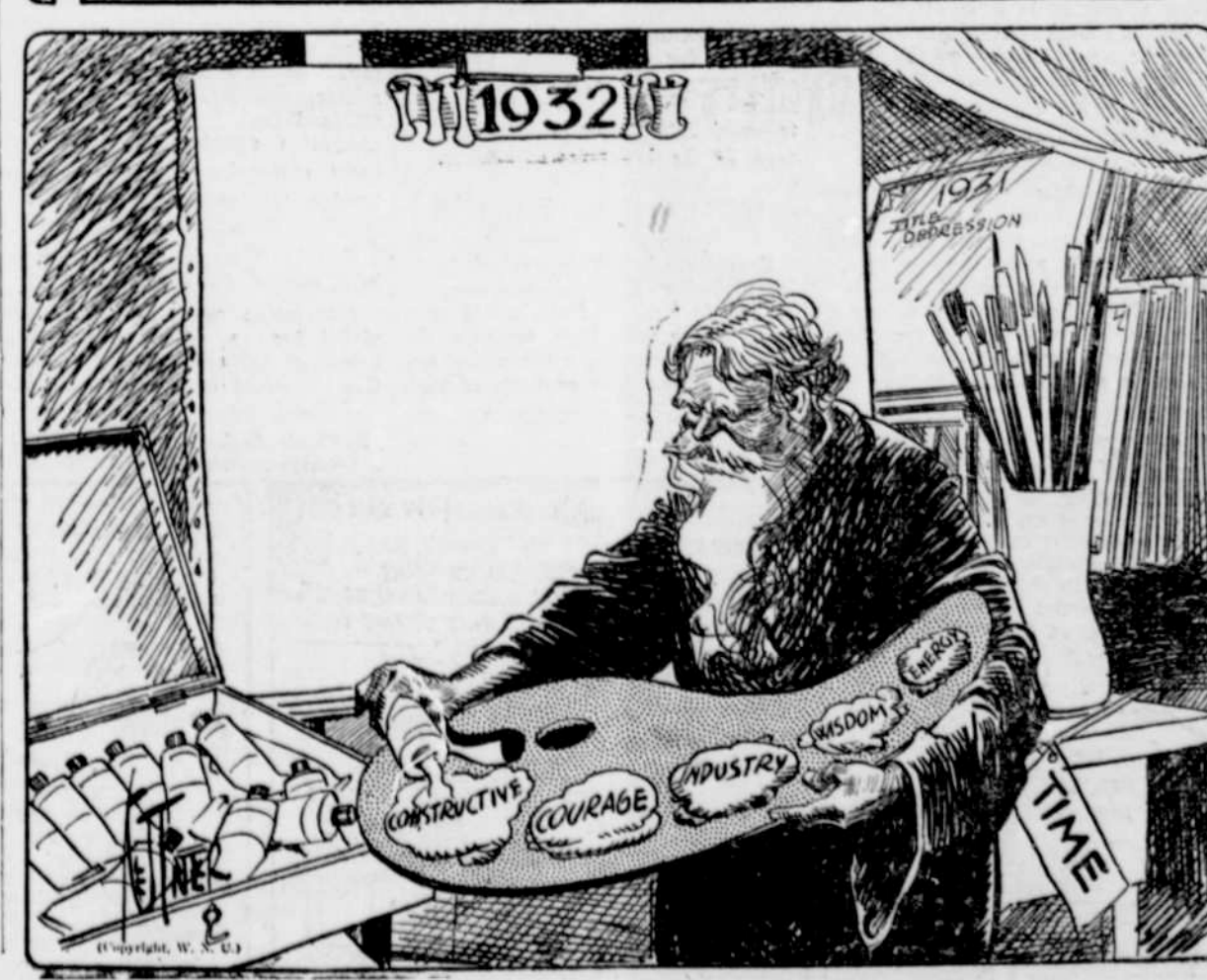
"Yeah," interrupts W. Cracker, "that's all his Satanic majesty needs—good people and more water."
