They are learning how at practically no cost they can enjoy conveniences and advantages they formerly thought unobtainable. Household planning experts have perfected the method, available for any housewife.

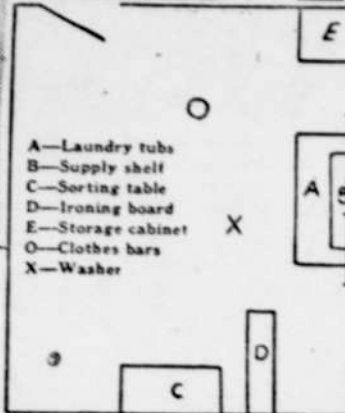

UNUSUAL MATINEE PROGRAM PLANNED

One of the most unusual of Sunday matinee programs is promised for the concert of Sunday afternoon, January 17, by Willem van Hoogstraten and the Portland symphony orchestra. Included will be the Sheherazade suite by Rimski-Korsakoff, the "Bartered Bride" by Smetana, and the "Farewell Symphony" by Haydn.

The Haydn work is one of the most astounding of that great composer's contributions to musical literature. As conductor of the palace orchestra for Prince Nicolaus Esterhazy, Haydn became anxious to return to Vienna but found the prince equally desirous of staying at his country place. As a hint, more or less gentle, that a change was needed, Haydn wrote the farewell symphony, in which the players one by one put up their instruments and leave. Two players and the conductor finish the work.

The "Sheherazade" suite is a musical version of the Sinbad the Sailor stories from the Arabian Nights. The music has all the color that a Russian composer would put into an already colorful story, and altogether is one of the most delightful of musical compositions of symphonic caliber. It was played here two years ago.

The "Bartered Bride," by Smetana, is another favorite with Portland audiences, and is played often. As usual the concert will start at 3 o'clock, and those attending are asked to come early enough to be seated before the music starts.

Seats will go on sale Wednesday at J. K. Gill's but mail orders will be received at any time.

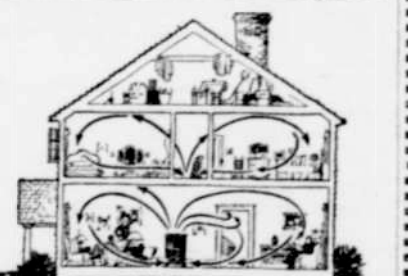
DECLAMATION CONTEST TO BE HELD

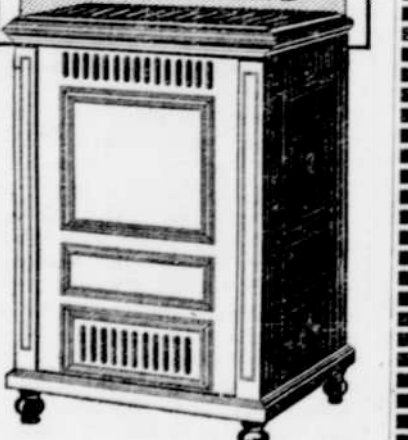
