

Grade School Will Give Washington Program

Plans Are Being Made For
The Annual County
Declamation Contest

SECOND TERM BEGINS

The First Game of the Grade School
Basketball Season Is Played

This week marks the beginning of the second term of the year's work. Each half year the averages of each pupil's grades are recorded on a card file for this purpose. Last Friday school was dismissed to make it possible for all teachers to record these grades as well as making and filing other records of the term's work. An inspection of these records show few pupils with failing averages, a goodly number with superior grades, and of course the great majority in the average class.

The next big event of the year will be the Washington's Day program to be held in the high school auditorium the morning of the 22nd of February. More attention is being given this memorial program than is usually done, since it is the bicentennial of Washington's birth. No one grade is making lavish preparations, but each is preparing one or two numbers, and all will be combined in a school entertainment.

Plans for the annual declamation contest held in Washington county are being perfected. This year Beaverton is being reclassified, and is included with Hillsboro and Forest Grove instead of competing only with schools of the same size, as has formerly been true. There are, however, many pupils with worthy ability in this line in our system, and it is hoped that a number of the honors will be won.

The Menhollatun company sponsors school contests among youthful essay writers, awarding a tube of mentholatum to the pupil writing the best essay on the "Care of the Skin." Since this is in keeping with some of the hygiene work being done in the fifth grade, pupils in that room are beginning preparation of compositions on this subject.

School visitors this week included Mrs. F. W. Livermore, Mrs. W. J. Mann in the first grade, Mrs. Boswell in the fifth, Mrs. Foster and Mrs. Christianson were also visitors.

Each grade's work covers some phase of arithmetic fundamentals rather thoroughly. The chief problem of the fourth grade is that of becoming proficient in working long division, and they are beginning work on that now. "Tis strenuous labor, however, and the young people have provided for their own relaxation by bringing a number of books from home, which they are privileged to read after they have completed other tasks. They call this collection their "Spare Time Library."

Snow was a cherished article at school the few hours it remained. Even the little fellows raced hither and yon scraping up every possible bit from car fenders, fence posts, woodpiles, and any other sheltered corner to be found. The melting didn't spoil the fun entirely, though, for it furnished the motivation for much hand work among the younger people—especially in the second grade room, where the pupils cut paper flakes after the patterns found outside, and in the third, where snow posters were enthusiastically produced. Following the snow the robins have fascinated everybody, from the youngest pupil to the teachers and janitor. Hosts of them, accompanied by many sparrows and a few juncos, have clustered about the building, picking up crumbs and feasting on apple cores scattered by the pupils.

Pupils who completed their eighth grade work last week and are now enrolled in the high school are Oris Nelson, Frank Lillegard, Arthur Plake, Henry Kamberger, Elizabeth Galloway.

The sixth grade lost three pupils this week—Crystal Foster, Thelma Jacobson, and Jean Clinton.

The grade school basketball team played the first game of the season Wednesday at Tigard. Return game will be played here in two weeks.
