FIND WAY TO SPEED UP MOTION OF AIR

New Types Warm Air Heating Systems Do Away With Cold Floor, Room Problems.

Plenty of heat where it is least wanted. That is the experience of practically all home owners who know the fact that there is insufficient warmth in the home where it is most wanted—at or near floor level. It is not uncommon, says the Holland Institute of Thermology of Holland, Mich., to find variations approximating 20 degrees between floor and ceiling levels.

Excessive indoor temperatures at ceiling level and inadequate temperatures at floor levels, according to engineers of the Institute, are due to the fact that as air is heated it becomes lighter and naturally rises. Cold air is more dense, heavier, and remains at the lower levels. So, in spite of the efficiency of a heating plant, there is much indoor discomfort due to unequal distribution of heat. Though a thermometer may indicate a temperature of 72 degrees F. at head level, the temperature at floor level where children play may be far too low for health and comfort.

This condition, says the Institute, is typical of that existing in practically all homes heated with old style heating systems of the hot air, radiator or stove type. These systems merely generate heat. They are not designed or equipped to provide for uniform and efficient distribution of the heat.

However, home owners need no longer suffer the discomforts incident to lack of uniform temperatures. The latest type warm-air heating systems are equipped with an electrically operated and thermostatically controlled air propeller unit. This is built-in to the bonnet of the heater. Its principal function is to force the warm air from the heater into the rooms of a house. The air motion thus developed, though draftless, is sufficient to force warmth into that "far northwest room" which ordinarily is so difficult to heat. But of more importance, it keeps the air in all rooms in constant circulation, completely changing it from five to six times per hour. The effect of this is to make impossible the formation of pockets of stagnant air, or the accumulation of heated air at the ceiling. Temperatures are practically uniform at all room levels.

In similar fashion, the air propeller unit may be utilized as a home-cooling unit in sultry summer weather. It keeps the home air in motion, breaking up pockets of stagnant, overheated air, and carrying away heat by heat and moisture. The comfort thus developed is equivalent to a drop in temperature of ten to fifteen degrees.

The Cook's Nook

Muffins from Iowa State College

2 cups flour
3 tps. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup sugar
1 cup sliced dates
1 egg
1 cup milk
1/4 cup shortening

Sift flour, baking powder and salt into bowl. Add sugar. Mix sliced dates through dry ingredients. Beat egg, add milk and stir mixture into dry ingredients. Add melted shortening and beat until smooth. Fill well-oiled muffin tins 2/3 full of the mixture. Bake in a hot oven (425° F.) for 20 to 30 minutes.

PINEAPPLE PIE

Take the crust first. Take a large can of shredded pineapple, strain, add 1 cup water to juice, a scant cup of sugar and heat. Add 2 heaping teaspoons of cornstarch mixed in a little water. Add 3 egg yolks beaten light. Cook five minutes, then take from fire, add pineapple and egg whites beaten stiff. Fill crust and put whip cream on top. This makes two large pies.

NOVELTY PIE

Line a deep pie plate with pie crust, fill with sliced apples, raisins and broken walnut meats, sprinkle with sugar to sweeten and cinnamon and dot with butter. Bake in a moderate oven (without top crust). If the apples get too brown before crust is done, cover with several thicknesses of paper. Make a custard with one pint of milk, yolks of 2 eggs, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon starch and 1 tablespoon of ground walnuts or almonds. Cool a little, then add 1 teaspoon of vanilla. Pour this over baked apple pie and cover with a meringue made by using 3 egg whites until stiff and dry, add sugar gradually and beat until thick like marshmallow. Bake in a

gas oven 15 minutes at 275 degrees F., or in an electric oven 15 minutes at 300 degrees F.

BEEF SHORTCAKE

Here is a recipe for beef shortcake, which is rather different.

Biscuits are made with the following ingredients: Two cups flour, 3 tablespoons fat, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup milk. Sift the dry ingredients, cut in the fat, add milk, mix lightly, cut into biscuits and bake in a quick oven.

Then take 2 cups of chopped cooked beef, 1/2 cup cooked onions, and 2 cups of sauce. The sauce is made from 1 cup of cream, 1 cup of meat stock, 1 tablespoon of flour, 1 egg and salt and pepper. Make a paste of the flour and 1/4 cup of stock. Add it to rest of liquid. Add the beaten egg. Cook the sauce 10 minutes in a double boiler. Then add all the other ingredients and serve hot over the halves of biscuits. The dough may be made into biscuits and placed on top of the meat combination and baked.

PARSNIP FRITTERS

Mash 3 medium-sized cooked parsnips. Stir into them 2 eggs, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, dash cayenne pepper, flour for a good batter (about 3 tablespoons). Drop by tablespoons in deep boiling fat and fry quickly to a golden brown. Serve hot with or without syrup.

CHEESE CROQUETTES

To two cups boiled rice add one egg, 1/4 cup grated cheese, salt and cayenne pepper to taste. Shape into croquettes, the size of a walnut, roll in egg, then in cracker or bread crumbs and fry in deep fat until they are a delicate brown.

When hashing cold meat add a little chopped parsley. It will improve both the taste and appearance.

Valentine's Day Recipes

PARTIES large and small; letters slipped through the mail slot; mysterious boxes of fragrant flowers and delicious sweets—these are symbols of the ever popular Valentine's Day. Novel tasters for the table are in order too—such as the following:

Orange Cherry Frozen Salad (Serves 6-8)

1 tablespoon cold water
1 cup whipping cream
1/4 cup powdered sugar
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 cup mayonnaise
1 1/2 cups drained orange pieces
1/4 cup chopped Maraschino or candied red cherries

Soak gelatin in cold water and dissolve over boiling water. Whip cream, add sugar, dissolved gelatin, lemon juice and mayonnaise. Mix well. Add red coloring to mixture to give a pink shade if desired. Fold oranges and cherries into mixture. Pour in mold and pack in alternate layers of ice and salt for 4 hours. Or put in tray of iceless refrigerator and chill until firm. Serve garnished with crisp hearts of lettuce. If desired, garnish also with additional mayonnaise or whipped cream, which may be tinted pink.

Apple Sauce Pudding

1 package vanilla junket
1 cup thick apple sauce
1 pint milk (or 1 cup milk and 1 cup light cream)

Season the apple sauce to taste with sugar and cinnamon or nutmeg. Divide it among six dessert glasses. Prepare junket according to directions on package. Pour carefully at once over the apple sauce. Let stand undisturbed in a warm room until set—about 10 minutes. Then chill and serve.

(Makes about 1 gallon—15 large glasses, 30 small)

1 pint sugar
1/2 pint water
1 pint tea infusion
1/2 pint lemon juice
