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The Cook's Nook

Hostesses Win Many Hearts With These Viands For Valentine's Day

Winning hearts has been quite the correct procedure for Valentine's Day ever since the martyred saint got himself a feast day, so it's an appropriate time for social conquests. February 14 falls on Sunday this year, making it possible for you to enliven Sunday dinner with Valentine's dishes, charm breakfast or supper guests with edibles in the spirit of the day, or entertain on the preceding Saturday night.

Human nature being what it is, serving delicious food is as sure a way for the hostess to win hearts as any other. To help you be everybody's culinary valentine, the home economists have developed some new recipes; they have been tested, tasted and are presented here.

First, there's a Valentine main-dish salad, plump red pimientos set in a gelatine heart—the most attractive salad seen in many a month and valentine-y as a cupid's quiver. While the recipe calls for soup stock you may use canned soup or bouillon cubes. The pimientos must be whole, plump, unblemished ones, so be sure to buy a reliable brand. The seven-ounce can contains six whole pimientos, the three and a half ounce can contains from three to four.

Stuffed Pimientos in Aspic
2 cups soup stock
2 tbsps. lemon juice
1 1/2 tbsps. gelatine
1/4 cup cold water
1/4 cup diced celery
1/4 cup cooked peas
1 tsp. minced onion
1 tbsps. mayonnaise
1 7-oz can pimientos

Soak gelatine in cold water for 5 minutes; dissolve in hot stock; add lemon juice; strain, and pour into six heart-shaped molds which have been rinsed in cold water. Drain pimientos and stuff with mixture of celery, peas, onion and mayonnaise. When aspic begins to stiffen, immerse stuffed pimientos in the jelly and allow them to stand until firm. Unmold and serve on lettuce. Pass mayonnaise. Six servings.

For a colorful dessert, with just enough of the traditional colors to make it festive, there is Valentine Peach Melba, an old dish in new guise. The rosy hue is provided by strained cranberry sauce, and to make the whole process a simple matter of assembling ingredients use the canned sauce, in the strained and bright red variety.

Valentine Peach Melba
6 peach halves
6 slices stale cake or 1 doz. lady fingers
1/2 pint vanilla ice cream
1/4 cup heavy cream, whipped
1/4 cup cranberry sauce
1/3 cup shredded coconut
Line sherbet glasses with strips of stale cake or split lady fingers. Place a canned peach half in the center of the dish with cut side up. Fill cavity left by removal of the pit with a small ball of vanilla ice cream. Cover with stiffly whipped cream into which the cranberry sauce has been folded. Sprinkle with shredded coconut. Serves six.

Hearts For Garnish
The strained canned cranberry sauce, used in the Melba recipe can be utilized to achieve the so-necessary hearts. Run a knife around the edges of the sauce after opening the can, and remove whole. Then slice the sauce in thin slices. Using a heart-shaped cookie or sandwich cutter, cut a heart from each round. Use as a garnish around the meat or fowl, or serve as a sauce. Attractive!

Dates are very necessary to any holiday which has to do with affairs of the heart. Kisses, too, are

believed essential to the smooth course of true love. When both are combined in a recipe and the result is a dainty—and wholesome—cookie you can allow the children to indulge freely.

Date Kisses
1/3 cup flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 pkg. pasteurized dates, sliced
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup almonds chopped
2 egg yolks
1 tsp. vanilla
2 egg whites

Sift flour, baking powder, and salt. Mix finely sliced dates and chopped nuts through flour with the fingertips. Beat egg yolks; continue beating while adding sugar gradually. Add vanilla and dry ingredients, dates and nuts. Mix well. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Drop mixture by rounded teaspoonfuls two inches apart on well-oiled baking sheet or inverted pan. Bake in slow oven (275° F.) for 25 to 30 minutes. Remove from pan with a spatula or broad-bladed knife. 40 cookies.

Household Uses For Lemons
To Replace Vinegar: Lemon juice may be substituted for vinegar in any recipe that calls for the latter except pickling.

To Sour Milk: Lemon juice added to sweet milk will sour it suitably for cooking.

For Stewing Dried Fruits: Add a small amount of lemon juice and grated lemon rind in stewing such dried fruits as prunes, figs, peaches and so on.

In Cooking Meats: Tough meats will be made tender by adding a teaspoon of lemon juice to water in which they are boiled.

MOCHA SAUCES
One trick that many housewives might learn from hotel and restaurant chefs is how to provide variety in the daily menus by preparing simple, inexpensive variations of standard dishes. An example of this is the use of coffee as a flavoring, particularly in sauces. Here are two easily-made mocha recipes:

Mocha Hard Sauce for Puddings
Make a coffee extract, using 1/4 cup finely-ground coffee, 2/3 cup sugar, 1 cup boiling water and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Mix the coffee and sugar and add boiling water. Boil 10 minutes, then strain through a double thickness of cheesecloth. Add vanilla, pour into a bottle, and store in a cool place until used.

Mocha Sauce for Ice Cream
Scald 1 1/2 cups of milk with 1/4 cup finely-ground coffee and let stand 20 minutes, then strain. Mix 1/3 cup sugar, 1/2 tablespoon cornstarch and 1/16 teaspoon salt, and pour over it gradually the hot coffee infusion. Cook 5 minutes while stirring constantly. Serve hot.

NEW WAYS TO USE CARROTS ARE EXPLAINED BY EXPERT
"Let's have some carrots today." Homemakers could say that every day of the month and still not serve those colorful and increasingly popular Oregon grown vegetables the same way twice—merely by following a new set of recipes for carrots just issued by the home economics department of the Oregon extension service.

"Thirty-one Ways of Using Oregon Carrots" is the title of a new six-page mimeograph circular by Lucy A. Case, nutrition specialist. Here are a few of the ways Miss Case tells of using carrots in her recipes: cream of carrot soup, glazed carrots, carrot fritters, salad combinations both raw and cooked, pie, pudding, carrot and peanut loaf, candied carrots, scalloped carrots, etc.

The list of recipes may be had from any home demonstration agent or direct from the state college at Corvallis.

THREE WAYS TO MAKE COFFEE

DO your friends praise your coffee? If so you have mastered one of the secrets of a good hostess, for in spite of the ease with which good coffee may be made, comparatively few have acquired the knack.

Good coffee may be made in three ways—provided a little care is taken by the cook. Be certain the coffee is fresh and the proper grind. Use a heaping tablespoonful to a cup of water. Do not "cook" coffee. Serve while hot.

Percolator
If a percolator is used, the coffee should be "steel cut" grind, which is a little coarser than corn meal. Packaged coffee can be obtained in the proper grind or most coffee merchants will grind it for you. The length of percolation depends upon the degree of heat applied. This can be determined by observation, but when it is once ascertained stick to it. Too long or too short percolation affects the taste.

Drip Method
Many devices for making drip coffee are on the market. If you have none, you can use a drip bag with a wire holder on an ordinary coffee pot. The coffee should be ground fine—consistency of corn meal—and the water poured through only once while still boiling.
