The Cook's Nook

Historians Fail to Prevent Cherry-Eating on Washington's Birthday

Cold-blooded historians tell us now that little George Washington told fibs like the rest of us, that he didn't own a hatchet and that he never chopped down a cherry tree in his whole life! Some insinuate that the beloved story is just a fairy tale out of the brain of Mason Weems, biographer of the Father of our Country.

With no eye-witnesses to uphold either side of the controversy, most of us will continue to believe our favorite anecdote. At any rate, cherries continue to be the traditional decoration and food-inspiration for February 22nd, and this, the 200th anniversary of our first President's birth, is no exception. Cherry recipes are very much in demand.

General Washington himself ate all kinds of food, prodigious meals that lasted for three hours, starting out with four kinds of meat and winding up with four kinds of dessert "prepared under the supervision of 'Patsy,' as he called Mrs. Washington." (Is it any wonder he weighed 220 pounds?)

There are a multitude of ways to serve cherries without resorting to pie. Just look!

Cherry-top Meringues

2 egg whites
1 cup confectioner's sugar
¼ tsp. salt
¼ cup almonds
¼ pkg. pasteurized dates
¼ tsp. vanilla

Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry; beat in the sugar, one-third at a time. Add salt and vanilla. Fold in chopped nuts and sliced dates. Drop mixture by rounded teaspoonfuls in smooth rounds on a well-oiled baking sheet or inverted pan. Bake in a slow oven (275° F.) for about 30 minutes. Press a candied cherry and 2 small strips of citron on each meringue. 36 meringues.

Red Cherry Salad

1 No. 2 can grapefruit
20 red cherries (canned)
10 toasted almonds
French fruit salad dressing
Lettuce or watercress
Arrange segments of grapefruit on bed of lettuce to form an ellipse. Allow four segments of fruit for each serving. In the cavity between segments place a row of red cherries which have been pitted and stuffed with halved toasted almonds

or other nut meats. Serve with French dressing made with grapefruit juice. Serves 5.

Mr. Vernon Candy Pudding

¼ pkg. raisins
1 pkg. pasteurized dates
2 tps. orange juice
¼ tsp. salt
2/3 cup candied cherries
1 cup candied pineapple
1 ½ cups shelled pecans
Grind dates and raisins. Add orange juice. Cut cherries in halves, pineapple in ½ inch cubes, and pecan meats in halves. Add these ingredients to the first mixture. Add salt and work with the hands until a solid mass is formed. Line a small bread pan with waxed paper. Press mixture into the pan. Put a weight on top. Let stand in a cool place 48 hours. Slice. 60 slices of "fruit cake."

Red Cherry Ring a la Patsy

2 tps. gelatine
¼ cup cold water
1 can grapefruit
¼ cup sugar
Juice of 1 lemon
1 cream cheese
2 doz. canned red cherries
2 dozen filberts
Mayonnaise
Lettuce

Soak gelatine in cold water 5 minutes. Cook sugar and juice drained from grapefruit until sugar is dissolved, add the lemon juice and gelatine; strain. Add grapefruit segments. Fill a cold wet ring mold half full with the grapefruit jelly mixture. Let stand in the refrigerator until it begins to thicken. Form the cheese into small balls about an inch in diameter. When the jelly in the mold has begun to set arrange these balls of cheese at regular intervals in the mold. Add the rest of the gelatine mixture and chill until stiff.

When ready to use unmold on a bed of lettuce. Pile the cherries and stuff with blanched filberts or other nut meats and fill center of the mold. Pass mayonnaise. Serves 8.

Sweet Cherry Sandwiches

¼ cup candied cherries
1 pkg. sliced candied orange peel
¼ cup crystallized ginger
¼ cup blanched almonds
1 tsp. orange juice
Chop peel, ginger, cherries, and almonds very fine. Mix well with orange juice. Spread on thin slices of bread and cover with a slice of lightly buttered bread. (Enough for 6 large sandwiches.)

Systems of Air-Conditioning Cut Down Huge Toll of Life and Health.

THE number of American soldiers killed by enemy fire in the World War was less than one-fourth of the number of people killed by impure air in American homes each year. During the World War 50,500 American soldiers were killed on the battlefields. But here in America and right within the homes, four times this number of people are killed each year by air-borne disease germs which cause colds, pneumonia, influenza, and other respiratory diseases, according to the Holland Institute of Thermology.

Heating and ventilating science has in modern warm air heating systems of the vapor air type—those which vaporize sufficient water to adequately humidify indoor air—developed an effective means of combating the millions of unseen disease germs that cause these diseases.

These systems are more than just heating systems. They are air-conditioning systems. In addition to furnishing ample warmth, they supply ample moisture to offset the lack of moisture in winter air; they develop moderate, uniform temperatures in every room; and they keep the air in draftless motion, completely changing the air in a home five or six times an hour.

In performing these various functions, modern warm air systems make possible a genuine indoor comfort during winter comparable to that enjoyed in summertime. The moisture in the air prevents the drying out and irritation of the delicate mucous membranes that line the nose and throat, enabling them to protect against disease infection. Furthermore, it serves to prevent the drying out of household furnishings. Dried-out furnishings are the source of much of the dust that is found in most homes heated the old style way. Also, moisture tends to cause dust to settle. So

on these two scores, the new type systems are a boon to the housewife because they make the housework easier.

In addition to keeping the home air free from dust, modern warm air heating systems serve to sterilize and purify the air as it is circulated over the hot heater.

In performing these new functions, supplying warm, humidified, sterilized air, heating systems of the vapor air type keep the respiratory membranes in a healthful condition. And by providing indoor atmospheres that assure complete physical comfort at moderate temperatures, they help us to build up healthy bodies capable of resisting disease infection.

Use More Water to Cut Fuel Bills

More extensive use of water as an aid to economical heating is forecast by the Holland Institute of Thermology of Holland, Mich. According to the Institute, home owners will in future consume pounds of water should be evaporated daily. In weight this means 64 pounds of water or practically two-thirds of the poundage of coal consumed, assuming 60 pounds of coal is burned per day.

Injecting the water vapor from this much water into the home air is most economically accomplished by heating plants of the vapor air type. The automatic humidifier that is a part of these systems, has capacity for evaporating from 3 to 25 gallons of water per day.

Obviously, fuel is saved by the maintenance of low temperatures. And the discomfort of the super-dry atmospheres created by high temperatures in homes and apartments is eliminated.
