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MELODIOUS PROGRAM HAS BEEN ARRANGED

One of the typically melodious programs Willem van Hoogstrater is so fond of arranging for the Portland Symphony Orchestra matinees, is announced for the program of February 28. Incidentally, Michael Arenstein, head of the cello section of the orchestra, will be the soloist.

The programs opens with "Russian and Ludmilla" overture by Glinka. This opera, the second of the composers great works, was hardly as successful as his "A Life for the Czar," but musically was much more important, and the overture ranks among the greatest of symphonic works.

Following will come the "Rococo Theme and Variations" by Tschai-kowsky and one of the Russian's most unusual works. This was written for the cello and will be played by Mr. Arenstein.

Two Wagnerian works are included, both familiar and much liked in Portland. These are the Prelude to act 1, "Lohengrin," and the "Forest Murmurs" from Siegfried. The closing work will be the second Hungarian Rhapsody by Liszt. While the composer has left many more works, this rhapsody is probably the most famous and well-liked of all his works, and in the orchestral arrangements loses none of the fire and vigor of the piano version composed by Liszt.

As usual, the box office will open on the Wednesday preceding the program but mail orders may be sent at any time to the symphony offices at 920 Failing Building.
