S. bureau of reclamation showing that the pasture acreage in this county has increased from 29,018 acres in 1930 to 39,123 acres in 1931—more than 10,000 acres. A further increase in 1932 is expected by C. A. Henderson, county agent, who says he is receiving numerous inquiries concerning pasture mixtures suited to the district.
