The Cook's Nook

"Alice Through the Pantry Door"
Finds Adventures in Cookery

"Are we (wo)men or are we mice?" Do we tackle unknown dishes with a twinkle in the left eye or do we sit and groan because three meals a day for 366 days (it's Leap Year) make 1,098 tablefuls of food per year? Do we realize that a deal of fun and adventure lurk right around that kitchen door?

Come now, don't mumble in your aprons that you can't do it. Ping out that inhibition and admit that we all must eat and that you might just as well have some fun out of cooking!

The rewards of the kitchen adventures or "Alice Through the Pantry Door" are many. Not only does she teach herself new tricks and make her rivals turn jade-green with envy, but, after the fun is over, there remains tangible and edible evidence that will tickle the family.

The kitchen ranger's tools are few: arm yourself with a reliable, tested recipe; use standard ingredients upon which you can depend; see that your equipment is in readiness. Then close that kitchen door and go to it!

Here are some recipes to inspire you. They are wholesome—they would be, because some of them contain healthful dates—and they are reliable, but they are exciting as tomorrow and require just enough skill to be amusing.

Surprise Scones

2 cups flour
4 tps. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
2 tps. sugar
2/3 cup milk
2-4 tps. shortening
1/3 pkg. pasteurized dates
4 marshmallows
1 egg yolk
1/2 cup chopped nutmeats

Pit dates, and stuff them with quartered marshmallows. Then sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Work in the shortening. Stirring with a knife, add milk to form a soft dough. Toss dough on a lightly floured board and roll out to a thickness of one-half inch. Cut in rounds. Place a stuffed date near one edge of each round of dough and press the edges of the round together to enclose the date. Brush the semi-circular scones with slightly beaten egg yolk which has been diluted with a little milk. Sprinkle with chopped nuts. Bake in a hot oven (450° F.) for 10 to 12 minutes. 15 scones.

1/2 cup nutmeats
1/2 pkg. pasteurized dates
1 tsp. lemon juice

Cream butter and stir in sugar gradually, then the beaten egg yolks and grated lemon rind. Stir in flour which has been sifted with laking powder. Spread mixture over surface of two ungreased layer cake pans. Cover each layer with meringue made by beating egg whites until stiff and beating in sugar gradually. Sprinkle cinnamon, granulated sugar and chopped nut meats over the top. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 20 minutes. While torte is baking, prepare filling. Mix sugar, flour, and salt in a small saucepan; stir in boiling water and dates. Continue stirring until mixture thickens. Remove from stove; add lemon juice and nut meats. Cool. Shortly before serving spread filling between the layers of cooled torte. 6 servings.
