Easter Flower

6 slices pineapple
1 No. 2 can grapefruit
2 seedless oranges
6 strawberries

Place slice of pineapple on glass serving dish. Cover round with alternate whole segments of grapefruit and orange. Fill the cavity in the center with a small mound of powdered sugar and top with a whole strawberry. The pineapple may be omitted.

Eggs-in-a-Nest

Line buttered timbale moulds or muffin tins with canned pimientos; break an egg into each mould, and poach in oven until the egg is set. Turn from moulds onto rounds of buttered toast and serve with cream or Hollandaise sauce.

Candy Easter

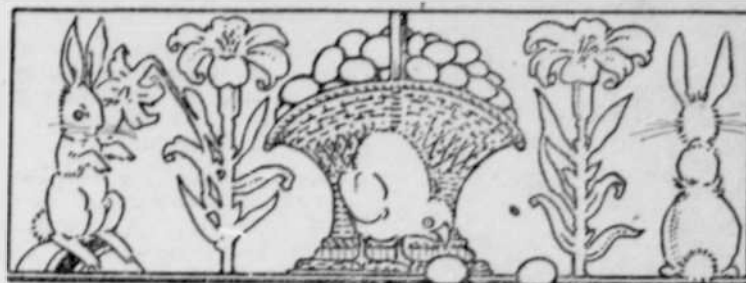
2 cups sugar
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup light corn syrup
Red fruit coloring
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 pkg. shredded coconut

Boil the sugar, water and syrup to the soft ball stage. Remove from fire and let it stand until lukewarm (110° F.). Add fruit coloring to make delicate pink. Add

ing to make delicate pink. Add vanilla and stir until nearly stiff. Add coconut and shape like Easter eggs. Place on waxed paper to harden. Makes 12 to 18 eggs.

These may be tinted various colors, if desired, or some of them dipped in melted chocolate and decorated with ornamental frosting. For the party, lay a candy egg in a "nest" of snipped green paper, and insert a place card fastened to a toothpick, in each one.

Dainties For Easter

EASTER calls for dainty dishes rather than the heavy goodies of Thanksgiving and Christmas. Salads, sherbets and desserts are in order. Here are a few recipes that will be appreciated by housewives looking for Easter surprise dishes.

Marigold Salad

(Serves 4)
4 to 6 oranges
1 head lettuce
1/2 cup shredded coconut
1/2 cup shredded carrot
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1 egg white
2 tablespoons sugar

This is an attractive salad, carrying out the gold and white color motif so appropriate to Easter. Peel oranges, removing skin down to juicy pulp. Cut in slices and cut slices in half. Arrange circle of orange half slices on individual salad plates, which have been covered with shredded lettuce. In center of orange circle, pile shredded coconut and shredded carrot mixed. Served with dressing made by lightly folding into mayonnaise a stiffly beaten meringue of egg white and sugar, to carry out yellow and white color scheme.

Easter Danish Cake

2 cups flour
1/4 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup ground almonds

1 cup strong coffee
1/4 cup shortening
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 cup seeded raisins
1/4 cup fine chopped citron
1/2 teaspoon salt

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt. Then work in the butter or lard with the fingers. Beat the eggs and add sugar. Make a hole in the center of the flour and fold in the egg and sugar mixture. Add coffee, fruit and nuts. Bake about 30 minutes in a rather hot oven.

Maple Dessert

1 junket tablet
1 tablespoon cold water
1 pint milk
3 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 cup maple syrup

Prepare vanilla junket according to directions on package. Just before serving top each dish of ice cold junket with 2 tablespoons of maple syrup.

Lemon Sherbet

(Makes about 1 1/2 quarts)
3 cups sugar
1 quart water
1/2 cup lemon juice
2 egg whites

Boil sugar and water together for 5 minutes to make syrup. Add lemon juice, cool and freeze to a mush. Add stiffly beaten egg whites and finish freezing.
