

City Fathers Hold Regular Monthly Meeting

The City Will Pay for Water As Registered By Company's Meter

USUAL BILLS READ

Street Lights Will Be Reduced In All But Business Section

The council met last Monday evening for their regular monthly meeting. New varnish on the chairs, desk and table in the council chamber added a note of dignity to the general atmosphere.

The usual bills were read and ordered paid with the exception of three: bill for new adding machine, bill from League of Oregon Cities, and the bill from the electric company for power for the street lighting system. These three bills were tabled for further consideration, due to certain difficulties.

The discrepancy in the readings of the two master water meters was slightly greater this month than usual. Hereafter the city will pay for the water as registered by the water company's meter, the councilmen having been convinced that their own meter was inferior. They were advised to require the water company's meter to be tested every six months.

The auditor's report was read and accepted. According to the report, the municipal water business is \$264.48 in the red for last month, due to a detective agency bill and other contingencies. Recorder Mrs. Richey, stated that the delinquent water accounts were reduced \$49 last month.

The city attorney, L. L. Myers, was instructed by the council to get information as to the procedure to follow in the preparation of a well for the city water supply. A well-driller appeared before the council and recommended a man to watch for water, and gave them a price on drilling a test hole. An engineer appeared before the council and offered to survey the well possibilities for the city for \$50.

In order to save money on the street lighting system, the council voted to reduce the street lights to 100 watts on all lights except those in the main business section of the town.

Dr. Talbot was elected by the council to fill the existing vacancy on the council until the next regular election.

Several other matters were discussed without coming to any definite conclusions, and the meeting adjourned at about 11:30 p.m., subject to call by the Mayor.

Samuel B. Lawrence was born at Burlington, Kansas, and came to Oregon from that State with his parents when ten years of age. His parents settled on a farm at Scholls, Oregon, where he worked until he graduated from the Hillsboro Public School; after which he taught school for three years in the public schools of Washington County; he then attended Tualatin Academy and Pacific University of Forest Grove, Oregon, where he graduated in 1908. In 1910 he graduated from the College of Law at the University of Washington, located in Seattle. Mr. Lawrence is admitted to the bar in both the States of Washington and Oregon and to the Federal Courts. In 1911 he was united in marriage with Vivian Johnson. Mr. Lawrence is a member of the Raleigh Parent Teachers' Association, Beaverton Grange, Beaverton Eastern Star and Beaverton Lodge No. 100, A. F. & A. M., the past treasurer of the United West-side Club, chairman of the Raleigh Water District, and is now chairman of the Board of Directors of Raleigh School. His law office is located in the City of Portland; his residence is at Raleigh Station, Washington County, Oregon, where he has taken an active interest in all community affairs.

Mr. Lawrence pledges, if nominated, to cooperate with Governor Meier in his policy of economy in the conduct of the State's business. He advocates that we adopt a system of taxation curbing the unscrupulous so they cannot vote unnecessary taxes upon us. There has been too much waste and extravagance in the operation of our higher institutions of learning. He believes in good roads and schools, but believes they should be maintained and operated with business sense and economy. "Lower the taxes; encourage capital and industries to come to our State; make fewer laws and strictly enforce them" is his slogan.

HIGH SCHOOL BUS IS IN ACCIDENT

High school bus No. 7, driven by Ernie Masters, collided with a load of wood on a truck driven by E. A. Andrews of Columbia Boulevard Tuesday evening, just after crossing the bridge on north Cedar street. About a dozen of the students riding in the bus were injured, none very seriously, though some sustained rather painful cuts from the flying glass.

The whole left side of the bus was broken in, damaging it to about the extent of \$250. Dr. Mason treated the victims as soon as they could get back to town.

The load of wood was said to have measured nine feet, a foot in excess of what is considered lawful width for a load.

Senator Hare Speaks At Cedar Mill Grange

Economic Feudalism Is Declared Existing In the United States

DECRIES HIGH TARIFF

He Claims Another Great Emancipator Is Needed Now

Ex-Senator Hare spoke on present-day conditions at the Tuesday evening meeting of the Farmers' Union at Cedar Mill grange hall. He gave as causes for "the depression" mass production and machines, consolidation of industry, the high cost of government, and the fact that we are still paying for the war.

The consolidation of industries has resulted in all public utilities being owned by a few on Wall Street, he said, and independent business has given way to an economic feudalism till we are robbed of American individualism.

The cost of government by additional bureaus and commissions for the "study and isolation of every bug to the flowering of the peanut was treated by the speaker with forceful sarcasm."

Another reason given for present day conditions of industry and commerce was the high tariff wall raised to protect eastern manufacturers till the world will not buy from us, which the Northwest feels, for example, in the lumber trade.

He advised balancing the budget by reducing government expense instead of finding additional ways of raising revenue. If more tax must be raised let it be by tax on incomes and inheritance in the higher brackets.

He said we must go back to the first principles of America—government by the people, not by the few. Our need (one that he felt would be met) is another great emancipator, or another rough rider with a big stick. Crisis and stress bring American spirit to the fore, and genuine honest American statesmanship will in the end prevail, was his thought as the inevitable solution.
