What It Means to Be a Cook

Perhaps you've heard or read this before, but in these days, when the woman in business is apt to feel herself more highly gifted than her homemaker sister, the words of John Ruskin deserve frequent repetition:

"Cookery means the knowledge of Meats and of Cereals and of Helen and of the Queen of Shells. It means the knowledge of all herbs and fruits and balm and spices, and all that is healing and sweet in the fields and groves and savory in meats. It means carefulness and inventiveness and willingness and readiness of appliances. It means the economy of your grandmothers and the science of the modern chemist; it means much testing and no wasting; it means English thoroughness and French art and Arabian hospitality; and, in fine, it means that you are to be perfectly and always ladies—lost givers."

In the Twinkling of An Eye

Make Your Cookies, Salad, Pie!

The dame in the old folk-song who could "make a cherry pie while the cat winks her eye" had not a thing on the modern cooks who have learned to whip up a batch of cookies in ten minutes, concoct a delicious dessert in fifteen, or fashion a salad in shorter time than it takes you to speak of that Robinson fellow.

Emergency, like the poor, we have always with us; "unexpected guests" always will be dragged home by husbands; friends always will drop in at meal time; wives always will play "just one more rubber of bridge before you go," and families always will howl for their meals on time! Just that long will we have need of recipes which require only a few minutes preparation time. Of course all good things to eat cannot be turned out in the twinkling of a female orb, but there are some perfectly simple—and simply perfect—dishes that can be. You have to do a little preliminary planning—one cannot get something for nothing at all—but it consists merely of seeing that your pantry shelf keeps stocked with jars of fruit, of mayonnaise, packages of dates, and coconut, and the other staples necessary to emergency meals.

Circumstances will provide the emergency; you provide the jiffy; here are the recipes.

Ten-Minute Chocolate Cookies

1 1/2 oz. chocolate
1/3 cup condensed milk
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. salt
1 lb. pkg. shredded coconut

Melt chocolate in a double boiler. Add milk, vanilla and salt. Stir in coconut. Drop by teaspoonsful on a well-oiled baking sheet. Bake in a very moderate oven (300-325° F.) for 15 minutes. Remove from pan while warm. 15 cookies.

Cake Folderol

6 thick slices sponge cake
6 thick slices sponge cake
1/4 cup butter
1 egg yolk
1 cup brown sugar
2-4 tbsps. cream
1/4 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup coconut
6 pasteurized dates
