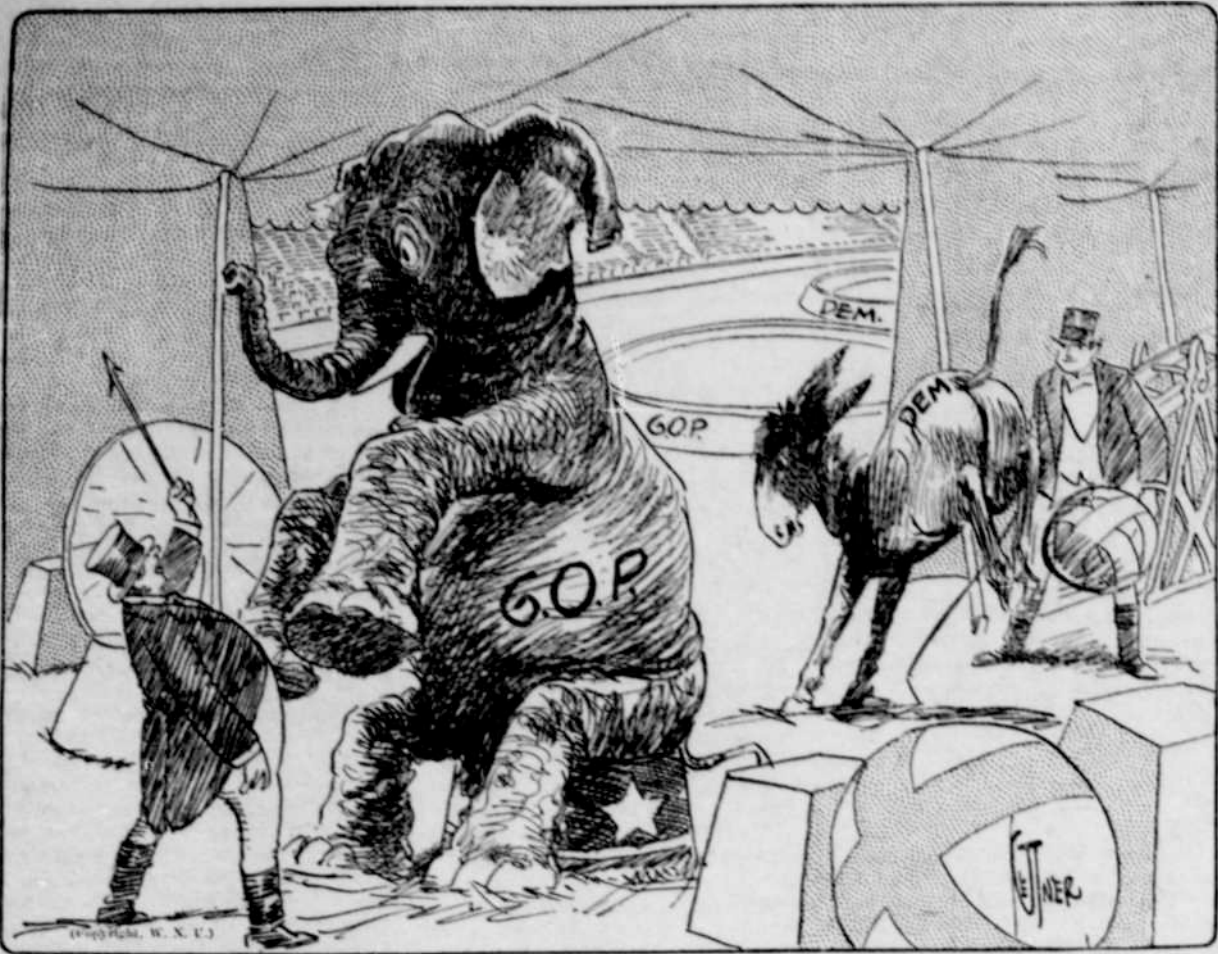


Rehearsing for the Big Show

REDUCE FEES FOR GRAZING LIVESTOCK

After consultation with the President, Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde has announced a fifty per cent reduction in the fees for grazing domestic livestock on the national forests during 1932, according to information received by Regional Forester C. J. Buck.

The President's authorization was made in recognition of the emergency situation facing stockmen as a result of last year's drought, the unusually heavy snows, and the prevailing hard winter.

Secretary Hyde is quoted as saying that a careful investigation shows conclusively that stockmen of the west who have grazing privileges on our national forests will experience great difficulty at the opening of the coming season. In many parts of the west deep snows have forced the purchase of an unusual quantity of high-priced feeds to keep flocks and herds from starvation. This, added to other emergency conditions, has persuaded us that the relief is desirable.

LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY SAVES UNDER MANAGER PLAN

Reduction of \$50,000 in the cost of the city government of Lexington through co-ordination and consolidation of departments and the elimination of "dead wood" has been accomplished since the city manager plan went into effect there two months ago, according to information furnished the National Municipal league by Mayor W. T. Congleton of Lexington.

In the process of doing this the wages of day labor were actually increased 20% on an hourly basis. "This was made possible entirely through the city manager charter which has eliminated politics," the Mayor declared. He pointed out the importance of drawing a strict line between the legislative and the administrative function of a city government.

In order to get back to the Pacific Coast in hopes of returning to Oregon, Johnson accepted the position of chief clerk of the new Federal Prohibition office located at Los Angeles. While in Los Angeles he was promoted to Associate Attorney, Bureau of Prohibition, handling all matters pertaining to collection of taxes and penalties under the Revenue laws. In 1926 he was transferred to the Seattle office as assistant to Wm. Whitney, Legal Advisor for the northwest territory. In 1928 he was transferred to Portland as Legal advisor for the State of Oregon which position he held until 1930 when he resigned to take up the active practice of law in his home town. It was during the period that Mr. Johnson was legal advisor for the State of Oregon that two of the largest conspiracy cases were made. They were Joe Brown, et al, and Case Bros., the latter operating one of the largest stills ever found in the State which was located near Six Corners.

In 1928 Mr. Johnson purchased the old Lehman farm near Metzger where he now resides with his wife and son. Mr. Johnson is a past commander of Kenneth H. Nash Post of the American Legion at Post of the American Legion at Washington, D. C., and organizer and past commander of West Hills Post No. 66 of Multnomah, Oregon. He is Junior Baseball Chairman and Legislative Chairman of District No. 1 of the American Legion at the present time. He is also one of the organizers and a member of the Board of Directors of the Tizard Lions Club. He is a Mason, Knight Templar and Shriner, also a Director of the German Baptist Old Peoples Home of Portland, Oregon. He holds a commission as First Lieutenant, U. S. Army Reserve Corps.

Mr. Johnson received his LL.B. degree at the Washington Law School, and his Master of Laws and Master of Patent Law degrees at the National University, Washington, D. C. He was admitted to practice law in Washington, D. C. in 1923. He is also a member of the Bar of the State of Oregon.
