FOUR SCHOOLS ENTER

Relays Are Postponed Until Thursday Because of Weather

The grade school track meet held on the Beaverton track grounds, Saturday, April 23, ended with a victory for Beaverton. Beaverton scored 67 points; Aloha-Huber came second with 57 points; Tigard was next with 28 points and St. Mary's last with 27. The relays were postponed until Thursday because of the rainy weather.

CLARK TALKS BEFORE GATHERINGS

During the past week, Colonel A. E. Clark, candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator, has elaborated on his preliminary statement regarding the issues in the present campaign, in his talks before grange and taxpayers organizations. Numerous invitations to address farmers of the state have been received by Colonel Clark and the Yamhill County Taxpayers league has endorsed his candidacy. The invitations have been accepted and an itinerary is being prepared that will send him into every section of Oregon.

Colonel Clark's attitude toward agriculture is indicated in a statement he has just issued and in which he says:

"We must have economic policies that will place agriculture on an equality with other industries and give freer access to the markets of the world. There must be more flexible credit facilities giving extension of time for payment of mortgages, spreading payments over longer periods and a reduction of amount of periodic payments in proportion as the principle sum of the mortgage is reduced. There should be substituted for the farm board a more efficient and economical agency or a complete reorganization of the board so as to eliminate excessive salaries, extravagance and unbusiness-like practices."

WHO IS C. C. CHAPMAN?

Let us go back to the legislative session of 1923, being a member of the state Senate of that session I speak from personal knowledge. When we were fighting to put over the first income tax in Oregon and finally through the cooperation given us by the late C. E. Spence, then Master of the State Grange. It passed both upper and lower houses and signed by Gov. Pierce.

Then C. C. Chapman went to the utilities and people of large net incomes raised \$50,000.00 and went out over the State of Oregon and told the people believe that if the 1923 income tax was left on the statute books of Oregon it would drive capital out of Oregon. We are just where we are today because we have had too many Chapmans in the State Legislature. We need down there just plain honest men who vote "Yes" for legislation that protects the Oregon home and farm and "No" when it hurts the home and farm.

These two institutions are the foundation of our nation, when they are prosperous all honest business is prosperous, when they perish the nation perishes.

In the announcement of my candidacy for the Republican nomination for District Attorney of Washington County, Oregon, appearing in the last week's issue of your paper, certain figures (which were furnished me) were quoted in reference to fines and the salary of my deputy which are in error. The basis I have used for my figures is the period from January 1, 1925 to January 1, 1932, this being both the period of my last two terms and the period during which I have employed a deputy. The proportion of fines and forfeitures during this period which the law appropriates for my use and expenditure and which I did not use but turned to the County was \$32,506.02. The salary of my deputy during this same period was \$12,375.00, leaving the net gain to the County by this arrangement \$20,131.02.

I would appreciate your publication of these figures as I do not wish to be misunderstood in this matter.

At an official meeting of the Washington county public health association held Tuesday night, April 19, the Hillsboro library, the action of the executive committee is employing Mrs. Hazel C. Foeller, R. N., as county nurse was supported by vote of the association.

The new health nurse has already initiated active health work with the schools of the county, offering her services to schools that have especially pressing health problems that need attention before school closes, it was reported at the meeting.

Picking up the work where it was dropped due to the resignation of the former nurse, Mrs. Grace Richmond, the new worker will meet as rapidly as possible the health problems that have arisen during the period the county has been without this type of service, it was pointed out by Mrs. Fritz Aberdeth, president of the health association. The work will be financed from the Christmas seal sale receipts.

Mrs. Foeller received her hospital training at Good Samaritan hospital Portland, and her public health work at the University of Oregon school of public health nursing where she took the year's post graduate course, receiving her public nursing certificate. She has also had post graduate hospital training.

During her work at one of the well known nursery schools in Portland she received unique experience with children which is considered by Mrs. Aberdeth and others who investigated her credentials prior to her employment, as of particular value to her work in the county. She comes with the endorsement also of the state board of health, bureau of public health nursing and child hygiene.

"Dr. C. A. Lambkin, Hillsboro dentist, spoke at the meeting on preventive dentistry and the value of early dental care for children. Mrs. Paul Hattersen spoke on the work of the county child study groups and pledged cooperation with the health work.

Miss L. Grace Holmes, R. N., of the Oregon Tuberculosis association pointed out that the cost of a full year nursing service was less than two packages of cigarettes for every adult male in the county, Dr. Huggins, Hillsboro physician gave a brief talk.

JERSEYS CAN BE REGISTERED FOR LESS

Owners of purebred Jerseys may now register cattle that are past two years of age for a fee of five dollars instead of the ten dollars that such registrations have cost, according to word received from the American Jersey Cattle Club. Officials of the Jersey organization state that this reduction is in line with present financial conditions over the country but that the reduction will probably be only temporary.

Thirty Boys Are To Enter Corn Contest

Seed, Purchased from Bierly Boys Will Be Distributed Free

PRIZES TOTAL \$60.00

Exhibits Are Judged On The Basis of Corn Shown and Records

First prize Minnesota No. 13 corn, grown by Amos and Ivan Bierly, has been purchased by the Commercial National bank, Hillsboro, and is being distributed free to boys of Washington County who are interested in the contest for 4-H corn club members.

Thirty boys have already signified their intention of entering.

To enter the contest a boy or girl must agree to grow an acre of corn from seed furnished by the bank, and to make an exhibit of 25 ears in the corn show held in the bank lobby each fall.

Prizes totaling \$60.00 are given each fall to the twelve exhibitors having the highest scores.

Exhibits are judged on the basis of 75 per cent for the corn shown and 25 per cent on the record book which goes with each corn project.

Club members growing an acre of corn under the bank contest are also eligible to exhibit 10 or 25 ears in the Union Stock Yards contest at the Pacific International Land Products show.

Thirty three exhibits were entered in the 1931 Commercial National Bank show. Thirty are already entered this year with at least one more club to be reorganized.

Boys and girls interested in 4-H corn projects should write or see W. S. Averill, assistant county agent, who has charge of crops and livestock club work.
