The Cook's Nook

Refrigerator-Rummaging, Pantry-Peeking, Is Greatest Indoor Sport

Not mentioned by the sporting editors, never listed in the sports curricula of the colleges, and yet one of our major indoor sports, is the time-honored game of pantry-seeking or "Ice Box Hide and Seek."

The sport is favored by the whole family, at any hour of the twenty-four, but it reaches its zenith along about mid-evening when the filling effects of dinner have worn off and thoughts of molar-polishers begin to fill the head of your veteran Rummager.

Sometimes this predatory pastime begins just after a party or theater; sometimes whole squads of friends and family will descend upon you in quest of a repast. And pity the poor home-maker who searches her pantry in vain "for the makings" (Mother Hubbard just wasn't in it).

Its no good at all shouting about digestion and not filling one's stomach at bedtime; such admonitions mean less than nothing to an old Rummage Player. All you can do is smile bravely, and fool them by making sure supply headquarters contain healthful ingredients. Then decide it's good fun anyway, and let them go to it.

Since husbands and sons are the ardent fans of this indoor sport, some simple sandwich fillings which they may prepare themselves are suggested here. A hot dish such as Pimiento Scramble is in order for that very late supper for guests, and, for the feminine shelf-searchers, a new kind of toast. Everybody likes that incredibly delicious Hot Mushroom Sandwich—and the young-steneration will be happy with Lilly White's Lunch.

Porto Ricos
On one slice of white bread, put a slice of canned pineapple (drained) and on the pineapple lay strips of canned pimiento or a round slice of pimiento. Press slices of bread together. (In making a quantity of sandwiches, remember that one No. 2 can pineapple and one 7-ounce can pimientos will make 16 sandwiches.)

Brown Beauties
This is that school box favorite, so popular with children. Spread brown or graham bread with butter. Then spread one slice with cottage or cream cheese. Press sliced pasteurized dates into the cheese and put on "the lid." 1 pkg. of cream cheese and 1/2 pkg. of dates will make 12 sandwiches.

Pimiento Scramble
5 eggs
1/2 cup milk
1/2 tsp. salt
1 2 oz. jar pimientos
1/4 tsp. pepper
2 tbsps. butter
Beat eggs slightly with fork; add salt, pepper and milk. Heat


Orange Coconut Toast
Toast bread on both sides, butter and spread with the Orange Coconut Spread. Then return to toaster to melt mixture and brown coconut. For 12 rectangles of toast mix the following amount of spread: 2 tablespoons orange juice, rind of 1/4 orange, 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup shredded coconut.


Toasted Mushroom Delights
1 loaf white bread
1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms
1 3/4-oz. can pimientos
1/2 lb. butter
1 small slice onion
2 tbsps. butter
2 tbsps. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
Wash mushrooms, drain the liquid from the can of pimientos. Chop mushrooms, pimientos and onion. Melt butter in a small saucepan; add the chopped mixture; cook over a low flame until mushrooms are tender. Stir occasionally. Sprinkle flour over the surface of the mushrooms and stir until the mixture thickens. Season to taste with salt and cayenne. Cool. Trim crusts from bread and cut into thin slices. Spread lightly with soft butter. Cover half the slices with the mushroom filling. Put together in pairs and toast. Cut sandwiches into inch wide strips and serve piping hot with a beverage. 3 doz. sandwiches.

Lily White's Party Lunch
The tiniest members of the family who must go off to Lily White's Party as bed is often called, will be happy and keep healthy with this snack: Place sliced pasteurized dates and a few bits of candied ginger in an individual glass dish. Pour milk over the dates, chill until cold and serve with a sweet cracker.
