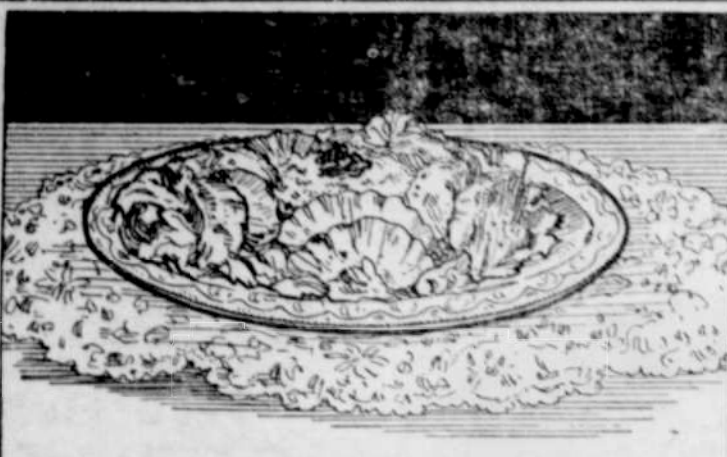


Recipes for National Child Health Day



SUNDAY, May 1, is National Child Health Day. This year, with conditions as they are, the day should be particularly important to parents.

The food needs of growing children must be met. Milk, milk products, fruits and vegetables must be served as well as the heavier foods—even on economy menus. Oranges, with their vitamin C, now sell at a low price and fit excellently into the menu. Here are two delicious recipes for National Child Health Day—and for the days that follow:

Orange Nog
6 tablespoons orange juice
4 tablespoons evaporated milk
4 tablespoons chilled water
1 teaspoon sugar
½ teaspoon grated orange rind
Beat or shake together thoroughly. Serve at once in a large glass. Serves 1.
This is an excellent breakfast or

mid-meal orange drink. The addition of citrus fruit juices to milk promotes the digestion of the milk and makes a very palatable drink. Children who will not drink milk alone, often like a milk and orange juice mixture.

Mayflower Salad
4 to 6 oranges
Lettuce
1 cup cottage cheese
Jelly
Peel oranges, removing skin down to juicy pulp. Cut out segments free from membrane. On an individual salad plate, place a bed of shredded lettuce. Center a mound of cottage cheese on this and circle mound with two rows of orange segments. Place a spoonful of red jelly on top of cheese. Serve with a dressing of orange or lemon juice beaten with an equal amount of melted jelly (2 tablespoons orange or lemon juice and 2 tablespoons jelly).

Total Circuit Court Fines from January 1, 1925 to January 1, 1932 \$132,242.50
Total paid state in same period toward support of State Prison Department \$25,656.88
Circuit Court expense same period including my deputy \$9,425.00

Excess of fines over and above expense \$8,160.62

Above Circuit Court expense embraces not only cost of all criminal cases including Grand Jury, trial jury and witnesses but in addition the entire cost to the county of all civil and equity cases, the court reporter, bailiff, Judge's Secretary, together with Circuit Court supplies and expenses and furniture for the new Circuit Court room and still leaves an excess of \$8,160.62. The above figures do not include the cost of the Bowles case which was paid by Multnomah County.

The fines above stated do not include Justice Court fines and fees which for the same period amounted to \$14,112.20, which is not segregated on the records as to civil fees and criminal fines.
