Political Meeting Held At Sherwood

Several Candidates For
Washington County Of-
fices Give Speeches

MANY PEOPLE ATTEND

Similar Meeting To Be Held At
Aloha At Some Future Date

The candidates meeting at Sherwood was much better attended than was the one held previously at Metzger. Probably two hundred people besides the candidates were present, including Mayor Wilson and Otto Erickson from Beaverton. There seemed some confusion in getting men to speak at first as the chairman, E. Hosmer, did not have a list of the names of the candidates present. He called the roll of the offices as scheduled on the election notice and the candidates for each office were asked to stand and announce their names. Gordon Taylor spoke for Senator Stewer but no one stood up to speak for any candidate for Representative to Congress, for secretary of state, for state treasurer, for attorney general nor for justices of the state courts.

Candidates from Washington county who spoke include Samuel Lawrence, and Arthur Ireland, candidates for Washington county state senator. John Thornburgh and Peter Zimmerman spoke as candidates for the joint senator from Washington, Yamhill, and Tillamook counties. A. M. Janssen, E. J. McAlister and J. O. Johnson spoke as candidates for representative from this county.

E. B. Tongue spoke as candidate for district attorney. Other candidates present, bracketed with the office they seek are: E. J. Ward, Donald Templeton, and H. A. Kurath, candidates for county judge; A. H. Erickson and C. W. Haynes, candidate for county commissioner (Mayor Wilson of Beaverton spoke for Jas. Lewis of that place for this office); E. B. Sappington and E. L. McCormick, for county treasurer; O. B. Krause and O. V. White for county school superintendent.

J. Welch representing the Aloha grange stated that there would be a meeting of the sort held at Aloha at some date to be announced later.

Hart Receives Credit For
Winning Three First
Places in Meet

REALLY WINS FOUR

He Is Disqualified In Last Event
For Entering 3 track events

Ross Hart, Beaverton high school athlete won the cup offered at Corvallis for the outstanding individual performance in the Willamette valley track meet held at the state college town Saturday.

Hart received credit for winning three first places though he really won four. He was disqualified from the last on account of a rule which prohibits entry in more than two track events. He took the 100-yard dash, the high hurdles, and the broad jump but was disqualified when he won the 220-yard dash.

High schools having track teams entered in the meet include Eugene, Corvallis, Cottage Grove, Dallas, Hill Military, and others. By his individual effort, Hart won 16 points, which is four and three-fourths more points than won by the next high man, Guggisberg of Cottage Grove, 11 1/4 points.

The Letter Box

Centralization of Wealth in the
Hands of the Few Will Destroy
our Government

The Constitution of U. S. says that "Congress shall have the power to coin money and regulate the value thereof and of foreign coins and fix the standard of weights and measures."

This authority has since been delegated over to a small group of International Bankers at Wall St. The cause of this deflation has been a forced deflation of the currency and a restriction of circulation, causing frozen assets, resulting in a tremendous falling of prices little short of the collapse of the competitive system, the remedy must be going back up the same scale we came down, then the remedy must be the inflation or an increase in the circulating medium, basic money, and this will bring about a thawing out of these frozen assets, forcing a general rise in prices.

I would suggest a bill in Congress for the issuing of three billions of legal tender, non-interest bearing treasury notes. This is approximately the amount of money taken out of circulation when the past ten years, 2500 of them being national banks (privately owned) and whose currency was destroyed when it reached the treasury at Washington, D. C.

This 3 billions of dollars of treasury notes to be issued by the government would be good for the payment of all debts, both public and private, and should be immediately used to pay the soldiers of the late war as a complete payment for service rendered during the war which the American people justly owe.

And in this bill I would include a penalty for any person or group of persons discounting American currency within the jurisdiction of the U. S. of America. An assault upon the currency of this country, emblematic of the sovereign power of the American people is treasonable and should be and must be punishable to the full extent of the law.

As this 3 billion-dollar fund is way back into the federal treasury, the payment of taxes if should be reassured as payment for service rendered the government, so that it may continue an active circulating medium.

It will not add a single burden to the taxpayer, but it will tend to relieve the burden of taxation upon the shoulders of the oppressed.

MRS. THURSTON DIES

Former Resident of Beaverton Dies
At Home of Her Son

ALBERT C. MEISNER

Albert C. Meisner died suddenly Monday, May 2, at his home near Tigard from the effects of what is thought to have been a stroke.

Meisner was born on a farm near Kenosha, Wis., March 16, 1861. There he attended public and high school; finishing his education at a divinity school at Wittenberg where he studied for the ministry.

However, he never accepted any pulpit, but chose the carpenter trade for his life work.

He married Mary Lentz at Clintonville in 1890 or 1891. Thirteen children were born to the union, twelve of whom survive.

The young couple moved to Oskosh but in 1899 they journeyed westward and settled on a homestead at Kamiah, Idaho, where the children all grew up.

In 1922, some of the boys having come to Oregon, the father came also, first to Ashland, then to Ridge, and finally, about a year and a half ago to Tigard.

One boy, Herman, and the mother preceded the father to that Other Land. Surviving are ten boys, Otto of Tigard, David of Willamina, Oregon, Albert, Wilhelm and Ernest of Kamiah, Gustav, Theodore, Fred and Martin of Battleground, Wash., John of Camas, Wash. and two daughters Mrs. Roy Knight of Kamiah and Miss Anna of Tigard besides twenty two grand children to mourn the loss of their dear one.

The remains will be buried from the Evangelical church at Tigard Friday afternoon at 2:00 p.m. W. E. Pegg, Beaverton mortician, has charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Thurston is survived by four brothers and a host of friends who will miss her lovable character.

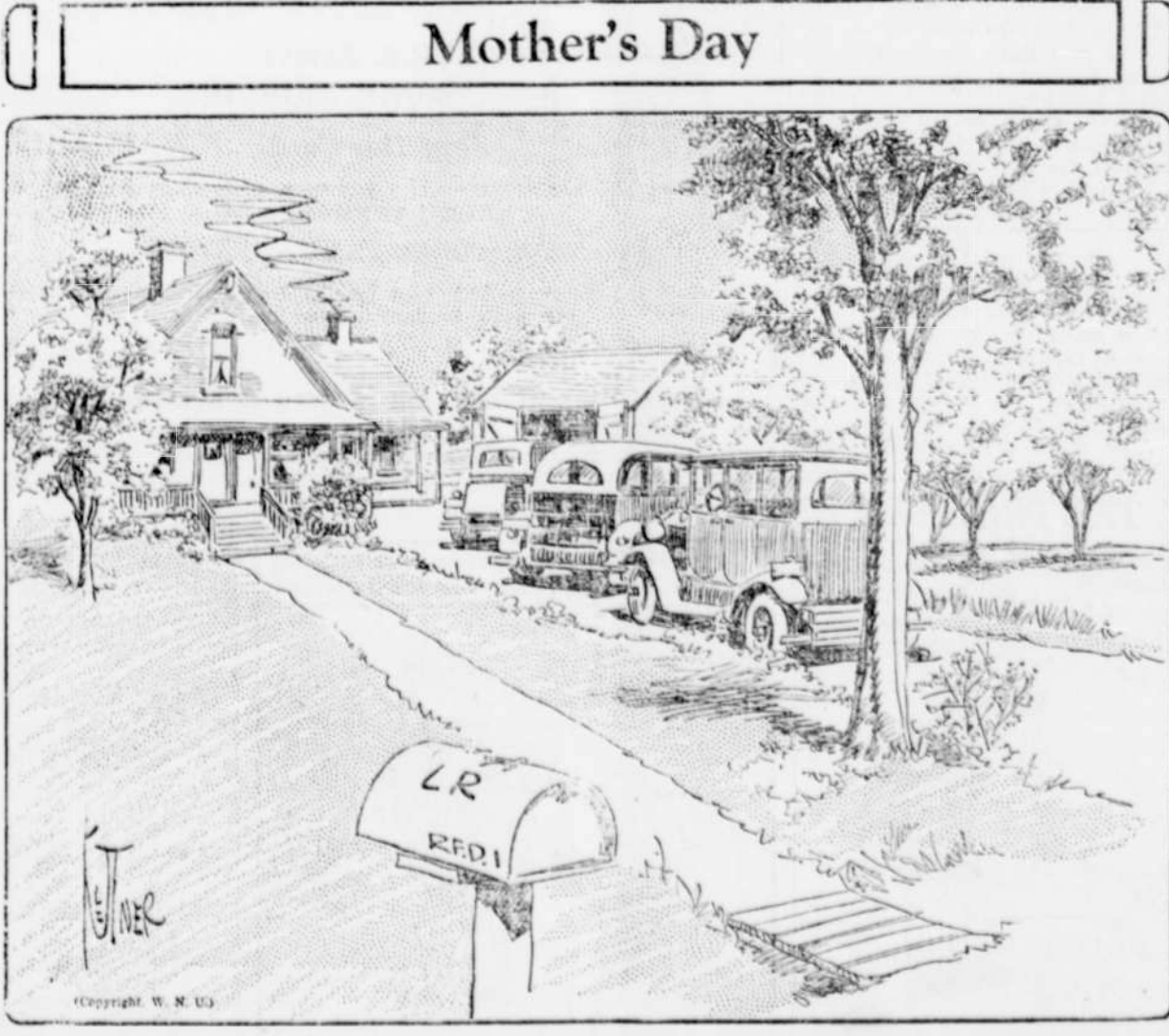
