They have nothing to do with the tax department whatsoever. They are records of the civil and criminal department only.

George Alexander in the years 1921, 1922 and 1923—Circuit court fines collected, \$51,269.89; fees, \$540.70; total \$51,810.59; expenses, \$19,961.51; total turned over to county clear and above expenses, \$31,849.08.

J. E. Reeves in the years 1925, 1926 and 1927—Circuit court fines collected, \$75,929.75; fees, \$3,547.90; total, \$79,477.65; expenses, \$35,951.81; total turned over to county clear and above expenses, \$43,525.84.

J. W. Connell in the years 1929, 1930 and 1931—Circuit court fines collected, \$34,543.37; fees, \$2,455.14; total, \$36,998.51; expenses, \$40,501.78; amount Connell is lacking of paying expenses, \$3,503.27.

Where George Alexander made a clear turnover of \$31,849.08, and J. E. Reeves \$43,525.84 above their expenses, J. W. Connell is lacking \$3,503.27 from even paying his expenses. J. E. Reeves made 976 arrears in the above three years and Connell made 760.

The sheriff's office should at least be self-sustaining and if nominated and elected I will put my utmost efforts in economizing upon the expenditures, and living up to the "Oath of my office."

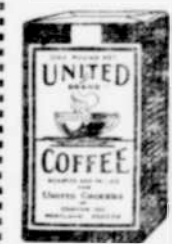
