The Letter Box

GOVERNOR MEIER WRITES W. G. HARE

Hon. William G. Hare, Hillsboro, Oregon.
My dear Mr. Hare:

I have your letter of May 9th in reply permit me to state that originally it was not my intention to participate in any way in the present senatorial campaign.

However, in view of the fact that you state in your letter that the voters are being deceived and misled by published statements that the water power legislation prepared by Colonel A. E. Clark at my request for the last legislature was not in harmony with the platform on which the late George W. Joseph was nominated for governor and on which I was afterward elected to the governorship, I feel that I can no longer remain silent.

These representations, of course, are utterly false.

Without compensation Colonel Clark drafted both the public utility and the water power legislation recommended by me in my inaugural message, — the most constructive legislation, in my opinion, ever enacted by a western legislature.

Without compensation and at his own expense Colonel Clark, at my request, accompanied me to Washington, D. C. last February to plead before the Board of Army Engineers and President Hoover for the development of the Columbia river, the principal plank in the Joseph platform on which I was elected.

In addition to having been in full accord with my water power and utility legislation, Colonel Clark has also rendered valuable aid to me in connection with my economy and tax reduction program.

I want to add in conclusion that the principals for which Colonel Clark is standing in this campaign are in accord with the policies of my administration, and I am supporting him because I feel that he would give Oregon fearless and aggressive leadership at Washington, a type of leadership needed for the development of the State's resources, the protection of its industries, the reduction of our tax burden and the elimination of the shameful spoils system which has been exposed in the press during the past few weeks.

St. Mary's Laundry And Bakery Burns

Fire Equipment Is Called From Beaverton, Hillsboro, and Portland

ORIGIN IS UNKNOWN

The Loss, Which Totals About \$3900 Is Partly Covered by Insurance

Fire of unknown origin broke out in the room above the laundry and bake room at St. Mary's Home for boys late Monday afternoon. Fire equipment from Beaverton, Hillsboro and Portland was called and arrived on the scene before the flames had made much headway but were unable to do very effective work on account of lack of taps sufficiently large to attack a fire hose to.

Several sacks of flour from the store room above the bakery, practically all the clothes from the laundry and some small items were saved but the building, the machinery, considerable fuel and other material in the store room and attached sheds were completely destroyed.

Luckily a strong northwest wind was blowing carrying the flames away from the main buildings as the Home, otherwise the whole plant would have been wiped out. Beaverton and other firemen kept streams of water playing on the side of the main building towards the fire and in spite of that one corner of the main structure was considerably scorched and the paint badly blistered.

Loss is estimated at about \$3,900 though it would cost much more to replace the machinery and equipment with new. Plans are already drawn for the reconstruction of the establishment and work will begin as soon as the enterprise can be financed. The loss is partly covered by insurance.
