Dessenger, accompanied by Mrs. Margaret Englemann. Two piano selections by Mrs. Englemann concluded the program.

BONDING ELECTION TO BE HELD SOON

Beaverton City council have been holding meetings almost weekly for some time past. Some legislation of considerable importance has been passed, notably a new initiative and referendum ordinance. Then at the meeting Monday evening of this week steps were taken to call a special election for the purpose of voting refunding bonds.

These bonds were voted at the last regular election held last December but bond attorneys have refused to state the bonds voted then were fully in accord with the laws of the state and that they might possibly be thrown out on account of being not quite technically perfect. It is to be noted that proceedings have been passed on by the same or similar bond attorneys and they have pronounced the issue free from legal loop-holes, but the present bond market tends to set scrutinizing machinery in action, with the result that somewhat like a school election that is of recent occurrence, there was a failure to meet all the meticulous legal technicalities. Therefore an election is to be called for June 4.

Another action meriting more than passing notice is the leasing of a dumping ground. This time the ordinance is passed, the ground leased and a day set, May 28, for "Clean-Up" day. Quite out of a blue sky, if financial skies can be said to be blue nowadays, comes a bill from the Oregon State Highway commission stating that Beaverton owes them some five thousand dollars as pay for a part of the construction of the new highway through the town, citing a resolution passed in October, 1927, in which the members of that council vote to pay a certain percentage of the costs of a new route through Beaverton. The communication was taken under consideration.

JEANNE POSSON WINS CONTEST

Jeanne Possion won first prize for the best design for the Rose show float. Walt Rosbraugh won 2nd and June Gilmore won 3rd. Thelma Tefft, Harold Peterson, Howard Petzold and Ardis Nelson received honorable mention. Miss Possion received \$10, and Rosbraugh and Miss Gilmore each received \$5. The prizes were given by the Beaverton Kiwanis club.

ON OREGON FARMS

Oregon City—The effectiveness of planting grass seed in the spring, as well as the ability of certain grasses to survive on land that is very wet in winter and spring, and very dry in summer, will be determined in a new trial planting on the farm of Charles Grassick at Estacada. The trial was arranged by County Agent J. J. Inskeep, with seed supplied by the Oregon Experiment station. Grasses included are English rye grass, velvet grass, harding grass, red top, Astoria bent grass, white clover, timothy, ladino clover and Reed canary grass.

Ma Minville—Several of the Yamhill county poultrymen are adopting a green feed program recommended by County Agent S. T. White to reduce feed costs this year. The program calls for the establishment of small plots of alfalfa, supplemented with roots and kale, to provide green feed throughout the entire season. Among those who have adopted such a program are Herman Bernards, L. E. Cabe, Dick Stevens and Mrs. Ida Mea Hamblin.

Bend—Spartan barley, a new variety for Central Oregon, is being tried out on the Herman Raach ranch at Terrebonne this year, using seed obtained from Michigan through the office of County Agent Gus Hagglund. This barley is said to be of special value as a nurse crop for clover. It has exceptionally stiff straw, thus reducing the amount of lodging, and yields well.

Eugene—A seven-acre field of sweet clover on the Glen Strome farm at Junction City, grown from stem-rot resistant seed furnished him last year by the Oregon Experiment station, shows an excellent stand, according to County Agent O. S. Fletcher, who visited the plant recently. A careful inspection failed to reveal a single plant attacked by the stem-rot disease.

FINAL STATEMENT OF MR. E. B. TONGUE

It seems necessary that I am again called upon to expose a few more campaign falsehoods. First it was reported that I had not paid my taxes for the last 20 years. That false statement having been exposed I am now calling attention to others which seem to be going around.

1st. It is said that the taxes have not been paid upon a certain city lot in Hillsboro for the years 1927 et seq and that the property belongs to me. This is absolutely false. I do not own the property. The only interest I have in it is a lien on it to protect which I will no doubt be forced to pay the taxes.

2nd. It is stated that the taxes are delinquent upon Lot 9, Freeman Acres, containing 2.12 acres amounting to \$239. This lot is part of my farm in the Poole D. L. C. and all taxes upon that farm are paid. My farm lies to the South of the road leading East and West passing the Scotch church. Some years ago the owners of the land lying North of this road filed a plat and called it Freeman Acres. The plat erroneously covers a small portion of my land lying South of the road and in this manner Lot 9 was put upon the assessment roll and assessed to the owners of the plat, and they, because they did not own it, did not pay the taxes on it and a certificate of delinquency was issued on it as their, not my, property. The owners who platted Freeman Acres after discovering the error and in order to clear the title to my land gave me a quitclaim deed to Lot 9, Freeman Acres, which I already owned and which should have never been included in the plat, and in this way it is my contention and always has been that the particular 2.12 acres were assessed twice once to me as part of my farm and once to the owners of Freeman Acres, and I insist that when I paid the taxes on my farm I paid the taxes on what is platted as Lot 9 Freeman Acres, and what is more during all these years I have been assessed with approximately 5 acres of land in the Poole Claim more than my title calls for. Hence the taxes upon the lot in Freeman Acres which appears delinquent have never in fact been delinquent and have always been paid.

3rd. The statement has been made that the taxes on this same farm for the year 1921 became delinquent and the County Court remitted the penalty and interest. This is true, but the fact of the matter is that on the 3rd day of April, 1922 I sent my stenographer over to the Sheriff's office to pay my taxes for 1921. I signed a check for the amount in blank to be filled in at the Sheriff's office covering all my taxes. The Tax Collector figured the taxes and the amount was inserted in the check which was turned over to the Sheriff and was paid, and the next February it was discovered for the first time that the Tax Collector in figuring the amount of my taxes had made a mistake and omitted my land in the Poole claim. The matter was taken up with the County Court and the County Court took the position that I should not be penalized for the error in the Sheriff's office, that the mistake was made in that office

and except for the mistakes the tax would have been paid April 3, 1922, and they concluded that as I had offered to pay all my taxes on April 3, 1922 I should not be penalized for the error and should be relieved of the penalty and interest, and on February 5, 1923 I paid the amount which had been previously omitted.

4th. The statement was made at the Forest Grove Chamber of Commerce on May 16, 1932, by Mr. Morgan that if the voters would examine the Certificate of Delinquency for the year 1919 they would find plenty of "Tongue" taxes that were delinquent. The inference sought to be made is obviously that these are my taxes. This is not the fact, and I own no interest in any of the property mentioned in this certificate and have owned no interest in any of it for about 20 years. If you will examine the tax suit now being brought by the county you will find the same properties included in the present suit under the names of the true owners except Lot 9, Freeman Acres hereinafore set forth, and a portion of the property now being redeemed.

An effort is being made in this campaign to cloud the real issue before the voters, namely: the selection of a lawyer to represent your interests, civil and criminal, in Washington county. I have been falsely accused of not paying my taxes, of not co-operating with the county officials, of squandering the tax money of this county and of conducting the criminal business of this county in a wasteful, inefficient, careless manner. Many of these statements I have answered, but neither time nor space permits the answering of all. I can only caution the voters against false statements that have been made and may yet be made that I will not have an opportunity to answer, and can ask you only to make a fair, impartial examination of the facts of the conduct of my office and I will abide by the results of your investigation. All manner of false statements have been made about me, my office and my family, yet the fact remains that Washington county is the outstanding county in the State of Oregon for law enforcement. The county has never lost one dollar through bad legal advice. I have won, so far as I can remember, every civil and equity case against

the county. I have won over 95% of the criminal cases prosecuted. Through the fines collected, your courts, civil, equity and criminal, have not cost the taxpayers one dollar. My office has not and is not costing the taxpayers anything. Through my arrangement for the employment of a deputy, Washington county has profited during the time he has been employed, over \$20,000.00, and lastly, the delinquent taxes about which so much has been falsely and maliciously said are actually being foreclosed through the efforts of this office.

I have conscientiously tried to give my best to Washington county as an officer and as a citizen. Upon this record of facts and achievement I submit my candidacy to the voters of Washington county without comment as to my opponent. Weigh the fitness and qualifications of my opponent and myself for this office and vote your judgment.

Cooks Who Start With Canapes

Will Finish Meals With Praise

"A good beginning is half the battle." —Don Quixote

A teaser, a promise of more good food to come, an appetite-rouser and a delicious, easy first course! All these things are a canape, the little relish served as the very first course of dinner. The Messrs. Funk and Wagnalls define a canape as "a slice of bread fried in butter or oil on which anchovies, mushrooms, etc., are laid," but that definition has long ceased to cover the multitude of toothsome spreads, pastes, fruit, fish or meat mixtures that are dubbed canape. And nowadays the little relish may be served on anything at all, but merely arranged on a plate. Some are even served piping hot.

Canapes are served in one of two ways, from a tray in the living room, before the guests go in to dinner, or served at table after the guests are seated. In the latter case they are often put in place before the guests troop in to provide a note of color and decoration.

Color, piquancy and variety are necessary attributes of your canape assortment. For that reason pimientos are one of the most popular canape ingredients, because they are colorful and tart enough to rouse, not satisfy, the appetite. In buying them, remember they may be procured in two ounce, three and three-quarter ounce, and seven ounce sizes. Choose the quantity you require and be sure to choose a well-known brand to get the plump, ripe red ones, free from seeds and skin.

Stop and Go Canapes These resemble traffic lights and are one of the few varieties which have "hills":

1 loaf bread
1 1/2 cup cheese spread
1/2 cup butter
1 2-oz. jar pimientos

Watercress to garnish
Cut bread into thin slices, then into rounds. Remove centers from half the rounds with small cutter or knife. Spread the other half of the rounds (the uncut ones) with softened butter and the snappy cheese which you have creamed or softened. In the center of half of the whole slices place small pieces

of canned pimiento. In the centers of the remaining whole ones, place watercress leaves. Cover these whole slices with slices from which you have removed the centers. The red and green centers will then be exposed. These are also good tea sandwiches.

Chop Cod Canapes (Sweet) Cut mold of canned cranberry sauce (use the strained variety, which comes in 7 ounce cans) into quarter inch slices. Cut thin slices of day-old bread into rounds with cutter or top of a can. Spread the bread with softened cream cheese. Place a disc of the cranberry sauce on each round and pile cream cheese around the edges, using a fork or pastry tube.

Georgia Canapes (Hot) 1 7-oz. can pimientos
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 lb. American cheese
Cayenne
Flour

Split the pimientos (there will be six large ones), drain. Sprinkle inner surface with salt and cayenne. Place rectangles of the cheese lengthwise on pimiento and roll up. Skewer with toothpicks, roll in flour, saute in hot fat 3 minutes (or until cheese melts and flour browns.) Serve hot on ovals of toast. Makes 12.

Fruit Canape Place a slice of pineapple on individual serving plate. Arrange alternate segments of orange and canned grapefruit on the pineapple. In the center place a whole pasteurized date which has been pitted and stuffed with cheese. Dot with mayonnaise if you like.

Spanish Egg Canapes 6 hard-cooked eggs
1 3/4-oz. can pimientos
1/2 cup minced celery
Mayonnaise
Seasonings

Olives for garnish
24 rounds of bread or 24 crackers
Chop celery, add eggs and drained pimientos and continue chopping until mixture is fine. Moisten with mayonnaise or salad dressing, season with salt, pepper and paprika. Spread on rounds of buttered bread or on round crackers and garnish with sliced stuffed olives.
