The Cook's Nook

How to Be Happy Though Hostess

Don't let the announcement, "company's coming" turn your household into a flurry! Get over the idea that "company" must mean all manner of busy bustling, with the house in an uproar and the kitchen topsy-turvy while the cook spends weary hours turning out food.

With motor cars so numerous, fast freights and even airplanes so plentiful, the advent of good traveling weather will bring frequent visitors to most of us, especially if we live in the suburbs or the country. City-dwellers do love week-ends!

A little planning and some "cooking ahead" can make your seizure of summer visitors a welcome event. If you keep yourself ready, with some goodies in the larder and some plans in your head, you can really enjoy your guests. Instead of hobnobbing with the kitchen stove all the time, you can chat with your company and learn how to be "happy though hostess!"

Fresh-keeping foods are, of course, those you will choose to "cook ahead" for your larder. Cakes and cookies which contain moist ingredients such as dates and the other dried fruits, or fruit peels, will remain fresh for days at a time if properly stored.

Your shelf of canned goods will yield soups and entrees, and fruits for cocktails or breakfast. Some recipes and menus for company use should be kept in your kitchen cabinet file, with one page devoted to quick or emergency dishes and perhaps another given to a list of foods your expected guest prefers.

Plan to use your refrigerator extensively while the guests stay; by arising early you can mix some delicious salad or dessert which the ice-box will make while you enjoy yourself. Plan your meals ahead of time, and if you are careful you will have no real cooking to do except the meat and a vegetable!

of the treasury have informed the United States George Washington Bicentennial Commission. It is expected that the quarter will be ready for distribution before June 1.

The design of the new coin was approved by Secretary of the Treasury Ogden L. Mills from more than a hundred models, many of them submitted by leading American artists. It was executed by John Flanagan, New York sculptor and the designer of the Department of Agriculture World War memorial.

The obverse of the new coin bears the portrait of George Washington in profile. Over the head appears the word "Liberty," and below it is stamped the date "1932." To one side is the motto "In God We Trust." The principal design of the other side is a spread eagle with the inscription "UNITED STATES OF AMERICA" and "E PLURIBUS UNUM" above, and "Quarter dollar" below. An olive branch also appears below the eagle to complete a stately, dignified design. The new coin is exactly the same size, weight and fineness as the present quarter dollar.

The George Washington quarter is the first coin of regular issue to bear the image of the first president. It was authorized by special act of Congress making it possible for the Treasury to share in the Bicentennial celebration.

As a coin of regular issue the George Washington quarter will replace the twenty-five cent piece now in circulation. No other quarter dollar will be coined for the next 25 years unless authorized by a special act of Congress.

Minted at San Francisco, Denver and Philadelphia, the coins will be placed in circulation through the regular channels of the Federal Reserve banks, and will appear simultaneously in all parts of the country.

1/4 cup orange juice
Sift dry ingredients; cut the cup of dates in eighths; mix dates through flour with finger tips. Cream butter; add sugar gradually, then beaten eggs and grated orange rind. Stir in flour alternately with orange juice. Pour batter into a loaf pan which has been greased and lined with greased paper. Bake in a very moderate oven (325 to 350° F.) for 50 to 60 minutes. 1 large loaf or 2 small loaves, (1 1/2 lbs.)

Below Zero Cheese Salad

(Delicious Dinner Salad)
1 pkg. (3 oz.) cream cheese
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1/2 pk. pasteurized dates
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup crushed pineapple
2 tps. lemon juice
1/2 cup cream, whipped

Mash cheese with a wooden spoon; stir in mayonnaise; mix until smooth. Add the 1/2 cup of chopped dates, pineapple, salt and lemon juice. Fold in whipped cream. Freeze in trays of mechanical refrigerator or in ice and salt for about four hours. Serve on lettuce with cream mayonnaise. Serves 6. Whipped evaporated milk may be substituted for the cream.

Fruit Melange

(Easy but attractive last course)
Stuff whole figs, dates, halves of peaches, pears or apricots (fresh preserved or canned) with a cheese paste or with cream cheese mixed with nutmeats. Arrange in a low glass dish or silver tray, with wafers or crackers in the center. See that each guest has an individual plate and small knife if fruit is large. Pass at table for dessert or for last course at a formal dinner.

Ruby Bananas

(Lend a "Company" touch)
1 7-oz. can cranberry sauce
2 tps. lemon juice or water
4 to 6 bananas
Beat the sauce with a fork until smooth; stir in lemon juice or water. Peel bananas and arrange on a buttered oven-glass baking dish. Cover with sauce. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) for 15 minutes or until the bananas are tender. Serve as an accompaniment to broiled meat or chicken, as a festive touch to the meal. 4 to 6 servings.

Cocoanut Strips

Slice bread 1/2-inch thick, remove crusts, and cut in finger-lengths. Dip first in sweetened condensed milk, then in shredded cocoanut. Drain and bake in moderate oven, (375° F.) for 3 minutes, or until light brown.

ORDINANCE NO. 135

AN ORDINANCE SUBMITTING A CHARTER AMENDMENT TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON, AUTHORIZING THE REFUNDING OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENT BONDS; CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: The following proposed amendment to the charter of the Town of Beaverton is hereby proposed for submission to the legal voters of said Town at a special election to be held in said Town as in this ordinance provided.

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL AN ACT

To amend the charter of the Town of Beaverton, Oregon, adopted at a special election held in said town on the 14th day of December, 1912, and all subsequent amendments thereto, by adding thereto Article XIX, providing for the refunding of Local Improvement Bonds.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON: That the charter of the Town of Beaverton, Oregon, be adopted at a special election held in said Town on the 14th day of December, 1912, and all subsequent amendments thereto be amended by adding thereto Article XIX to read as follows:

ARTICLE XIX

SECTION 1. Whenever any of the outstanding Local Improvement Bonds of the Town of Beaverton shall become due and there are insufficient sinking funds with which to pay such bonds, the Council is hereby empowered to issue refunding bonds in an amount sufficient to pay the excess of such outstanding bonds over the amount of existing sinking funds applicable to the payment thereof. Such refunding bonds shall be in substantially the same form as the original improvement bonds, shall bear interest at a rate of not to exceed 6% per annum payable semi-annually, shall mature in ten years and be subject to call for redemption at any interest date after one year

from the date of issue, and be in such denominations not exceeding \$500.00 as the Council shall determine. All refunding bonds issued under the provisions of this article shall be sold for not less than par and accrued interest; Provided that if no satisfactory bids are received for said bonds the Council may exchange said refunding bonds for outstanding bonds then due. All funds derived from the sale of refunding bonds shall be placed to the credit of the bond and interest funds applicable to the payment of such outstanding bonds and be used for the payment thereof.

SECTION 2: This ordinance for proposed Charter Amendment submitted to the voters by the Council shall be filed with the Recorder upon its approval by the Mayor, for the submission of said Charter Amendment to the legal voters of said Town of Beaverton for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held therein, which special election is hereby called for the 4th day of June 1932. The recorder shall give notice of such special election by publication thereof in the Beaverton Review, such notice to be published ten days preceding the date of said election. The election shall be held in the Town hall and the polls shall open at 12 o'clock, noon and close at 7 o'clock P. M. C. E. Hedge, Mable Alexander, Louanna Underhill are hereby appointed to act as judges, and Anna Hyland and Carrie Summers as clerks at such election.

SECTION 3: The Ballot Title for said proposed Charter Amendment shall be:

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL

REFUNDING IMPROVEMENT BOND CHARTER AMENDMENT: Purpose: to amend the Charter of the Town of Beaverton by adding thereto Article XIX, authorizing the Council to refund outstanding Local Improvement Bonds, when the same become due and existing sinking funds are insufficient for their payment.

SECTION 4: The Recorder of the Town of Beaverton is hereby instructed to publish the heretofore proposed Charter Amendment in the manner provided by the ordinances of the Town of Beaverton and The Beaverton Review is hereby designated as the newspaper in which such publication shall be made.

WHEREAS certain local improvement bonds of the Town of Beaverton are now past due, and in order to refund said bonds it is necessary that the Charter of said Town be amended as provided in this ordinance, now therefore:

An Emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon its adoption and approval.

Passed by the Council this 16th day of May, 1932.
