AND WILL YOU HAVE A PICNIC! "A-Maying we will go" is the way the ancients put it. We indulge in no such poetry, but we have the same delightful urge that sent them to the outdoors in May-time, and mean the same thing when we cry "let's have a picnic!" Jokes about the discomforts and the mishaps continue; "bring your own ants" and "don't go near the water" are still regarded as the height of humor. But if it hadn't already begun for you, Memorial Day has begun the "open season" on picnics for all who know the joys of good food eaten under the sky. And too, although the ardent picnicer (pursuant to Oregon law) thinks that the back lawn diner is on a par with the who rides in the chariot on the merry-go-round, still there is much to be said for the simple home supper served on the porch or out of doors. Picnics are modernized and if you have kept pace you advance quit laboring for days in hand over elaborate things. Prepare simple things, which will pack and carry well to withstand the trip. Be sure the food is substantial enough for outdoor appetites. Avoid heavy food and include some popular fruit of the "non-crushable" variety. If the children go along provide some healthful sweetmeat, a package or two of dates for instance, which will keep them happy but ward off "day after" effects.

Picnic Pies
1 recipe Pastry (2 cups of flour)
1 cup cranberry sauce
1 1/2 cups lemon juice
2 tbs. of 1/2 lemon
2 tbs. water
1 cup pasteurized dates
1 cup seedless raisins
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 cup cranberry sauce
For stewed fruit, add lemon juice and rind, water, chopped dates and halved raisins. Stir until well blended; remove from stove; add nuts. Cool. Roll pastry to 1/4 inch thickness; cut into rounds about 3 inches in diameter. On half of the rounds place a teaspoonful of the filling; cover with the second round; press edges together firmly; prick holes in top. Bake in a hot oven (450° F.) for 15 minutes or until golden brown. 16 to 20 pies.

Stag Sandwiches
1 can pimentoes
1 lb. bacon sliced
1 loaf bread or 1 doz. buns
Butter
Cook bacon until crisp. Drain pimentoes by holding over can until juice runs off. Fold one strip of bacon into a half pimento, lay on buttered bread or bun, put on top slice.
A half-ounce can of pimentoes and a seven-ounce package of bacon will yield twelve very large sandwiches.

Savory Sandwiches
1 1/2 oz. can pimentoes
1/2 cup peanut butter
1/4 cup chopped sweet pickle
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1/4 tsp. salt
Chop pimentoes and sweet pickle together. Mix with peanut butter and salt. Add mayonnaise until proper consistency to spread. Makes sufficient filling for 12 large sandwiches.

Sweet Salads
Spread one slice of lightly buttered bread with peanut butter. Cover with a layer of chopped pasteurized dates. Spread a second slice of buttered bread with currant jelly or cranberry jelly. Put slices together in pairs. One-half package of pimentoes, 1/2 cup peanut butter and 1/2 cup of jelly will be sufficient for 1 dozen sandwiches.

Chocolate Coconut Drops
1 1/2 cups chocolate
1/3 cup condensed milk
1/4 lb. pkg. shredded coconut
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. salt
Melt the chocolate in a double boiler. Add milk, vanilla and salt. Stir in coconut. Drop by teaspoonful on a well-oiled baking sheet. Bake in a very moderate oven (300-325° F.) for 15 minutes. Remove from pan while warm. 15 cookies.

ORDINANCE NO. 135
AN ORDINANCE SUBMITTING TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON, AUTHORIZING THE REFUNDING OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENT BONDS; CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: SECTION 1: The following proposed amendment to the charter of the Town of Beaverton is hereby proposed for submission to the legal voters of said Town at a special election to be held in said Town as in this ordinance provided.

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL AN ACT
To amend the charter of the Town of Beaverton, Oregon, adopted at a special election held in said town on the 14th day of December, 1912, and all subsequent amendments thereto, by adding thereto Article XIX, providing for the refunding of Local Improvement Bonds. BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON: That the charter of the Town of Beaverton, Oregon, be adopted at a special election held in said town on the 14th day of December, 1912, and all subsequent amendments thereto be amended by adding thereto Article XIX to read as follows:

SECTION 1: Whenever any of the outstanding Local Improvement Bonds of the Town of Beaverton shall become due and there are insufficient sinking funds with which to pay such bonds, the Council is hereby empowered to issue refunding bonds in an amount sufficient to pay the excess of such outstanding bonds over the amount of existing sinking funds applicable to the payment thereof. Such refunding bonds shall be in substantially the same form as the original improvement bonds, shall bear interest at a rate of not to exceed 6% per annum payable semi-annually, shall mature in ten years and be subject to call for redemption at any interest date after one year,
