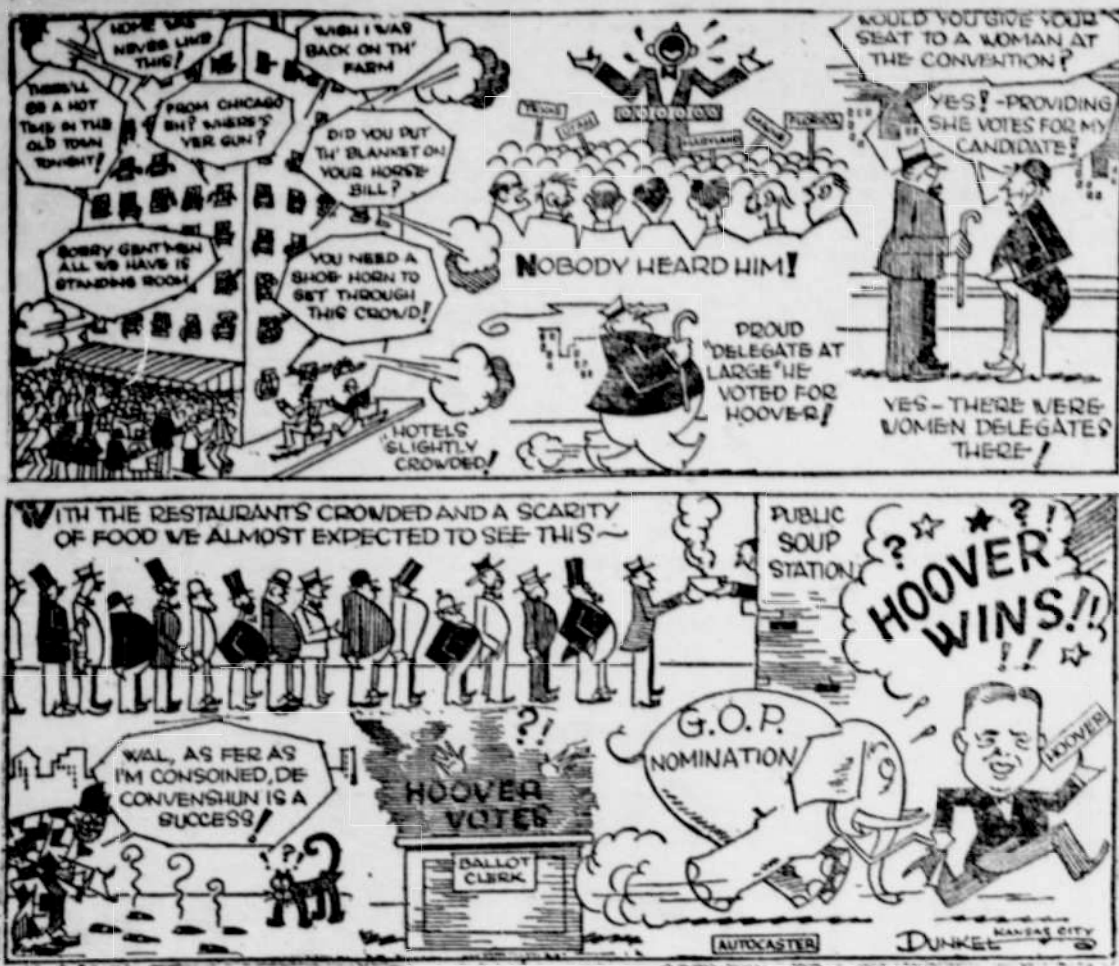
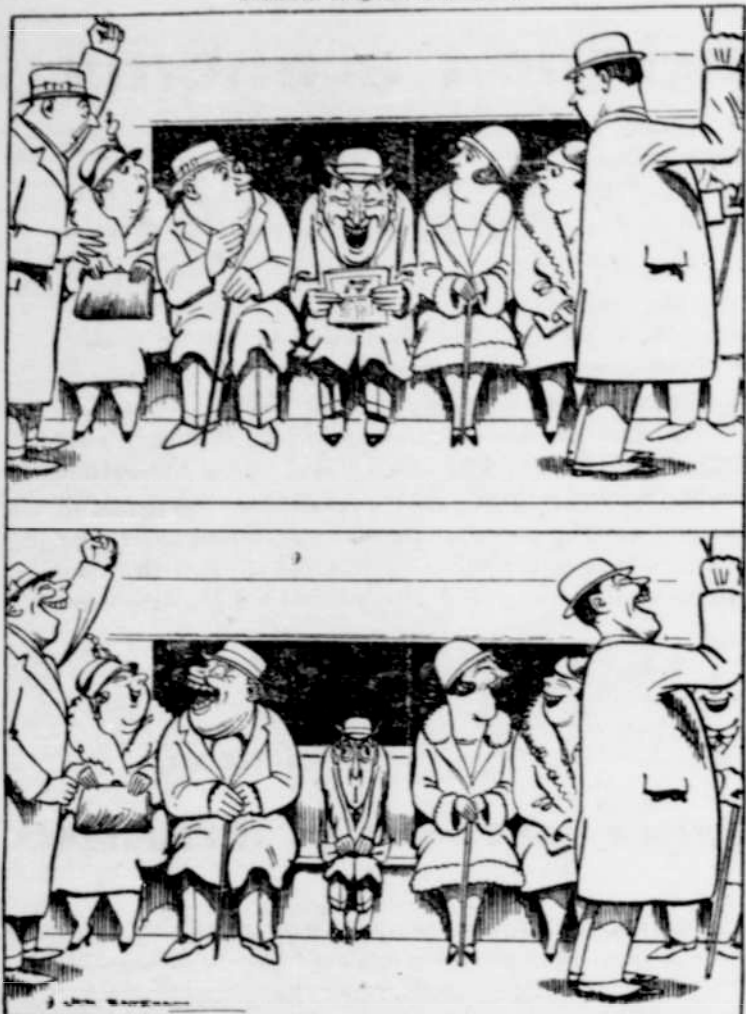

ON OREGON FARMS

Klamath Falls—Reliance wheat is being tried out this year by Harold Bunch of the Henley district and French Johnson of Tule Lake, in co-operation with County Agent C. A. Henderson. Mr. Johnson is also growing some early Baart wheat and Atlas barley this year.

The Dalles—A recent check-up made by County Agent W. Wray Lawrence indicates that created wheat grass, tall oat grass, bromegrass, tall fescue, English rye, Reed's canary grass and winter blue grass are making the most promising showing in the second year in 15 nurseries of Wasco county. No comparative difference has shown up among trials of Grimm, Cossack, Baltic, South Dakota No. 12 and Ladak varieties of alfalfa so far this year, Mr. Lawrence says.

COUNCIL VOTES TO BUY SPRING WATER

(Continued from front page) completed that the supply of water for Beaverton for the next 20 years has been definitely solved. It is hoped that the additional revenue derived will enable the City to pay off the bonded indebtedness left over from the old water systems.

A great deal of credit is due the present City Council and City Attorney Myers for their consistent efforts to obtain water at a cost that will show a profit instead of a loss. We understand that the Water account shows a loss of some \$225 this year.

Regarding the right of way for the pipe line from the Springs to the Reservoir and from the Reservoir to the Beaverton pipe line, thanks should be given to Judge Templeton and members of the County Court and to H. E. Weed of Weed's Nursery who have donated Right of way. Mr. Weed stated that he was only too willing to help in any way he could at no cost to Beaverton.

It would be well for people of Beaverton to visit these Springs and see for themselves and sample the wonderful water they will receive on completion of this project.

COLLEGE ISSUES SEVERAL BULLETINS

Despite low egg prices many Oregon poultrymen are taking advantage of equally low lumber prices to improve their poultry plants and get them in shape for more efficient production for the better times believed certain to follow.

To meet the demand for approved plans for poultry construction in this state, the Oregon State college extension service has just issued a series of three bulletins prepared by the poultry and agricultural engineering departments of the college, which contain descriptions, bills of materials and detailed plans for constructing range houses, brooder houses and insulated egg rooms.

These bulletins are: "Building Plans and Bill of Materials for O. S. C. Portable Brooder House", bulletin No. 446, by A. G. Lunn, head of the poultry department.

"O. S. C. Range House", bulletin No. 442, by Professors Lunn and W. J. Gilmore.

"How to Construct an Insulated Egg Storage Room", bulletin No. 445, by F. E. Price and A. G. Lunn.

These bulletins may be had free from county agents or the college direct.

Pam's Recipes By LEA LANE

Pam's budget is showing signs of strain. An inexpensive cut of meat is in order for the evening meal. She decides to prove she can make a round steak a dish fit for a king.

Cheaper cuts, she has heard, are improved by using sugar as a seasoning; so she mixes 1/2 cup of flour, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper.

She pounds this into the steak on both sides; then broils the steak to a turn in a frying pan, along with 2 slices of onion and a chopped green pepper.

She adds fried tomatoes as a garnish and proudly places the steak before her hungry Dad. "A dish fit for a king," is just what he calls it after the first taste.

First Preserved - First Eaten

STRAWBERRIES are usually the first fruit or berry to be canned because they are first on the market. Unfortunately, they are often the first to disappear from the preserve closet—because they are so delicious. Grandmother's old-fashioned "pound-for-pound" strawberry preserves are still remembered in thousands of homes.

Try some strawberry dainties this year. The berries are now in season and canning this month is not so tiresome as it will be late in the summer. There is little to buy except the berries and the sugar. The latter is inexpensive, but it turns your strawberry dainties into a wonderful quick-energy fuel for cold weather.

French Strawberry Preserves
Wash and hull strawberries. Weigh, and for each pound of fruit allow three-quarters of a pound of sugar. Pour sugar over the berries. Let stand several hours, until a syrup is formed. Place over a flame and bring to a boil. Boil one minute. Remove from fire. Set in a cool place over night. On the following day, again bring to a boil. Boil two minutes. Remove from fire, and leave in a cool place until the third day. On the third day, boil for three minutes.

Strawberry Jam
4 quarts strawberries
3 pounds sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Wash and hull the berries. Pick out the largest. Crush about one quart of the smaller berries. Add the sugar to them. Cook rapidly in an enameled saucepan and stir until the sugar is dissolved and a thick syrup is formed. Add the rest of the fruit. Continue cooking, stirring to prevent scorching. Cook until quite thick, about three-quarters of an hour, then add lemon juice. Jam is thicker cold than hot, so should not be cooked down too much. Pour into sterilized jars. Seal immediately.

Strawberry and Rhubarb Conserve
Strawberries may be combined with rhubarb for a delicious conserve which has the additional merit of being rather out of the ordinary.
1 quart strawberries
1 quart rhubarb
1 1/2 quarts sugar
Cut the unpeeled rhubarb in one-half-inch pieces. Mix the strawberries, rhubarb and sugar. Cook together until it is thick and clear. Pour into sterilized jars. Seal immediately.
