TWENTY-ONE ENTRIES

Riding Horse, Decorated With
Roses Is Last In Parade

The young people and children of Beaverton staged a junior parade in town Thursday afternoon.

There were 21 entries besides a flag, carried by Rayburn Davis, who lead the parade and two banners, with "Beaverton" printed on each.

Lois Livermore, who had been crowned queen, rode in the head wagon, which had been very tastefully decorated with flowers.

Bicycles, go-carts, wagons, scooters, baby buggies were so covered with beautiful flowers as to be very hard to distinguish just what they were. There was even a "wild Indian" in the parade. There was a huge firecracker marching along, in which there was only a pair of little feet showing at the bottom to tell that it was a human being.

A riding horse from the Sorren to district, also decorated with roses, was the last in line.

Mrs. McCully of the Safeway Stores had charge of the parade.

PLAN OF STATE BOARD IS OUTLINED

The new unified system worked out by the State Board of Higher Education and which goes into effect July 1, 1932 (today), has accomplished these things:

1. Saved the taxpayers \$900,000 in operating expenses annually.
2. Unified the University of Oregon and the Oregon State College under one administration with a chancellor at the head.
3. Preserved all investments, both public and private.
4. Preserved the University as a great cultural school, the College as a great technical school, and the normal schools as fully established teacher training centers reaching all parts of the state.
5. Has accomplished every objective of economy and unity without impairing what the people of the state have built up by 60 years of sacrifice and endeavor.

The proposed bill, to merge the two schools would completely wreck this program that has been evolved after three years of study and research, and which has attracted the praise of educators from all parts of the country.

IMPORTANT CONFER- ENCE TO BE HELD

The Conference on International Relations is to hold a series of round tables and public speeches in Portland from July 11 to July 15. The conference is being sponsored by the higher educational institutions of Oregon. Dr. Victor P. Morris, Ph.D., Professor of Economics of the University of Oregon is director of the Conference.

The two subjects which will have preference at the roundtables will be "The Near East Problems" and "The Current Depression." Membership to the roundtables is required. The University of Oregon summer session students have honorary membership upon paying the regular registration fee.

DR. BOYD SPRAGUE RECEIVES LICENSE

Dr. Boyd Sprague, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Sprague, has completed a five-year course in dentistry at the North Pacific College in Portland and was graduated with the June class of 1932. Dr. Sprague was an active member of the student body of Beaverton high school for four years and was graduated with the class of 1927.

The session of the Oregon Dental Board started June 13, examinations lasting four days. Returns from the Board were sent out June 22, and among those receiving license to practice dentistry in the State of Oregon, Dr. Sprague was second youngest of a group of twenty eight applicants.

As yet Dr. Sprague is undecided as to where he will locate, but hopes it will be near Portland where he has many friends and acquaintances.

STRAWBERRY GROW- ERS MAKING PLANS

Despite unfavorable economic conditions resulting in an extremely low price, the strawberry growers are going ahead with plans for another year. Growers are not planning on increasing the acreage, but some are intending to make improvements in their planting stock with the idea of making their production more efficient and economical.

Much of the uneven growth apparent in our berry patches is due to disease, according to George M. Darrow of the United States Department of Agriculture and S. M. Zeller of the Oregon Experiment Station. Root weevil, crown borers, spittle bugs, and leaf spot all account for some of our trouble in the berry plantings. Good, healthy, vigorous plants are necessary where good yields of berries are obtained.

Anything that dwarfs the plant results in a decreased yield. In talking to growers at field meetings in the county recently, Darrow and Zeller have mentioned a disease called "crinkle" as the cause of some of our grief. This is a virus trouble which can be eliminated only by selecting runner plants that come from parent stock that is free from the trouble. Several growers have started this selection work either with their own stock or with certified planting stock from Washington.

One or two new strawberry varieties are interesting growers in this county. One of these as yet has only a number and is referred to by that number, which is, "520." This is a berry that has the characteristics to make it suitable for the cold pack trade. Growers who have it or have seen it are generally interested as it presents a very attractive appearance and the berries are all of a very uniform shape. Processors and handlers are cooperating in giving this berry a trial to see if it is going to prove satisfactory to the trade. "Corvallis number 12" is another variety which some few growers are trying. This is strictly a canning berry so apparently has only limited possibilities.

Strawberry growing has been profitable in Washington County and should continue to be so under normal conditions. During the past winter and spring it has been apparent that we have some berries planted on land where in some years we are going to lose them. With suitable land a grower who is in the strawberry business can probably well afford to stay in but attempt to improvements is necessary.

TAXPAYERS OF PORT- LAND HOLD MEET

Portland, Oregon, June 24—At the Heathman Hotel last night the taxpayers of Portland in a largely attended meeting, endorsed the bill initiated by the Marion County Taxpayers Equalization League for the consolidation of the student body of Oregon University with that at Corvallis to form one institution for higher learning in the state, to establish junior colleges at Ashland and LaGrande, and to place a standard four year teacher college at Eugene and to abandon the buildings at Monmouth.

After speakers had pointed out that consolidation would save at least half a million dollars out of the more than \$2,000,000 budgeted by the state board of higher education for instruction alone, one-fourth of the \$450,000 annually expended for extension work and half of the \$240,000 that is annually budgeted for "business management" at three offices—Salem, Eugene and Corvallis, a committee was appointed to organize the state in support of the bill to raise money to carry the facts to the people through circularization and radio and to combat the propaganda emanating from opponents of the bill to the effect that consolidation will impose two million in increased costs, or any other considerable sum on the state.

The committee is composed of Elmer Goudy, chairman, Charles F. Parker, Miles Belden, H. Ashley Ely and George Knudsen. It will immediately attack the program of work laid out for it.

KINTON SCHOOL DIR- ECTORS ELECTED

At the annual Kinton school meeting held at the school house last Monday evening, the following board of directors were elected: S. H. Pomeroy, chairman, Frank Holboke for two years, and J. J. Van Kleek, re-elected for three years, Alice Richards, re-elected for one year. Mr. VanKleek has served on the board much of the time for the last 40 years. The budget meeting was postponed for some time in the near future, as it was found necessary to make a number of necessary repairs to the building and the committee in charge asked for more time to investigate and make estimates. There were 36 tax payers present and cast their votes.

ALOHA WATER USERS ASK LOWER RATES

On Thursday June 23 Charles Thomas of the Public Utility Commission met with the residents of Aloha to hear the case of the water users of Aloha vs. Tualatin Water company. The water users asked reduction in the present water rates and also an extension of the service down Wheeler Ave. to the old Hillsboro road. The commissioner took the matter under advisement. G. W. Lippert represented the water users in the role of attorney.

IN OREGON HOMES

Eugene—That family eating habits have been materially improved as a result of extension meetings in foods and nutrition is apparent when report blanks are summarized. From 19 communities, enrolling 400 homemakers, 3544 improvements are reported. These include 112 children drinking more milk, 127 adults drinking more milk, 173 individuals correcting constipation, 524 eating more vegetables, 335 eating more whole grain products and 317 eating more vegetables, 335 eating more whole grain products and 317 eating more regularly. Suggestions on improved eating habits were passed on by those enrolled to 497 other homemakers. These meetings were supervised by Gertrude Skow, home demonstration agent, and Lucy A. Case, nutrition specialist in extension.
