ON OREGON FARMS

Elgin-Ladak alfalfa, which has been reported as superior to other sorts in some Oregon sections, is apparently not as well suited to this region as Grimm, judging from demonstration tests made by local farmers. On the Luther Hindman place the Ladak apparently made a better growth, but careful measurements of yield showed that the Grimm outyielded it for the first crop by considerable margin.

Troutdale—Plans have been completed for establishing a 40-acre irrigated pasture demonstration on the Hallrose ranch near here. Twenty acres will be in permanent grass pasture, part of which is native grass, part tame and part Reed canary grass. Twelve acres of red clover will be used as a demonstration this year.

Sheridan—Farmers of this region have expanded the area under irrigation this year. W. H. Brandt has established some six acres of irrigation on a new farm he has just purchased. He will get the water by gravity from the Old Mill ditch. O. F. Daniels has added four acres to the land he irrigates from this same source. S. T. White county agent assisted in establishing these systems.

NICOTINE DUST DESTROYS INSECT PESTS

Vegetable growers remember rather vividly the damage done recently by the larvae of the diamond backed moth during a period of a very few days. This is practically over now but it calls to mind an economical preventive treatment for similar insect pests.

Dusting with a combination of nicotine and lead arsenate will take care of both plant lice, or aphids, and chewing insects, like the cabbage worm. Nicotine dust should be either used soon after being prepared or kept in tight containers.

Fudge for the Bridge Table

DOUBLED and redoubled! The game is close and there is no time for napping. After an exhausting day, when your energy is at a low ebb, have you ever noticed that you almost subconsciously reach for a sweet at the bridge table? Scientists, who delve into the whys and wherefores of fatigue, have proved that sugar gives the quickest energy reaction. Perhaps that is why we instinctively nibble as we play—and why we should always supply sweets in some form to our bridge playing guests. And nothing is more appreciated than home made fudge, which is so simple to make and so inexpensive in these days when sugar is selling at a price reminiscent of those days we refer to as "before the war."
Here is a recipe which you may find tempting: Melt three squares of unsweetened chocolate. Add three cups of sugar, one cup of milk, a tablespoon of butter and boil until the mixture forms a soft ball in cold water. Remove from the fire, add a teaspoon of vanilla and beat until the fudge begins to thicken. Pour into buttered tins and cool. The candy can be varied by pouring it over marshmallows, which have been cut in pieces and placed in the tin, or by adding chopped nuts just before it is poured out. If you like peppermint flavor, try beating in a drop or two of oil of peppermint, depending on its strength, after the candy has been taken from the stove. Four or five marshmallows, or four or five tablespoons of marshmallow whip beaten into the fudge while it is still hot, gives it a smooth creamy consistency.
