ON OREGON FARMS

Grants Pass—Conservation of food on Josephine county farms has attained a new high mark this year, through the operation of the portable canning outfit designed and built by County Agent Herbert Howells. It has been making record runs throughout the county so far this summer, one day putting up 452 cans of vegetables and 447 cans of meat. This is equivalent to a capacity of 2500 cans of vegetables alone. The canning outfit was financed by the county court and is being operated under the supervision of the county agricultural and home demonstration agents.

Forest Grove—Joe Kember, local dairy farmer, is lowering his production costs through use of an otherwise waste piece of ground for Reed canary grass pasture. A few acres seeded to this moisture-loving grass is now supporting ten cows and maintaining them in good production without grain. This grass is ideally adapted to low, swampy land, says County Agent Cyrus.

Roseburg—A combined educational and recreational county poultrymen's picnic was held here in Klamath park Sunday, July 31. Many local poultrymen attended this meeting who will not be able to go to the state poultrymen's convention at Corvallis August 11 and 12. CITY COUNCIL MEETS IN REGULAR SESSION

Following Monday night's session, when the Council adjourned to meet Wednesday evening, some of the aldermen came to the conclusion that action on a few matters had been a little too hasty and a motion was made to re-consider the letting of the well drilling contract and after that had been carried, another motion to reject all bids and re-advertise for bids was also carried.

Alderman Alexander was appointed a committee of one to see about hiring an assistant marshal to be on duty from six or seven in the evening until Marshal Boring came on at ten or eleven. A motion prevailed to advertise for bids for the construction of a suitable building to house the fire truck. The refunding bonds were ordered printed and the ordinance authorizing a contract with Phil Polsky was repealed.

A resolution which brought out considerable debate but which finally carried was one calling for the advertising and selling of all property on which the City has liens which are more than sixty days delinquent.

It has always been considered that these liens could not be foreclosed until all the installments were due. Even then, they were not foreclosed in 1929 were not foreclosed in 1931. However, some of the newer aldermen are insistent that all accounts owing the city must be paid promptly and City Attorney Reimer states that these liens can be foreclosed.

This vicinity are taking more and more interest in production of pure seed, much of which is certified. taking. The probabilities are at three to one against the securing of a really satisfactory water supply from this source.

The reason for considering a well supply as we understand it is the probability of delays in securing rights to the springs heretofore considered. We agree with you that this delay is unfortunate and that Beaverton is in serious need of something better in the way of water supply. However, it must be appreciated that present conditions will make it difficult to finance waterworks improvements even if other delays are eliminated. Assuming that a satisfactory test well were secured, this would practically exhaust the current funds of your Water Department. To follow this up by drilling a second well of larger size, purchasing and installing pumps, laying pipe lines to and from the reservoir, and otherwise completing a workable plant, would require additional funds that must necessarily come from the sale of bonds. We see nothing gained by drilling a test well at this time unless you are in a position to follow up such test well with a permanent installation.

A further comment that we will make is that the basis of drilling wells at so much per hour has not generally proven as satisfactory as a lineal foot basis. The hourly basis is practically the same as the "cost plus" contract which has proven objectionable in general construction work. Public contracts always bring criticism from citizens and taxpayers and cities generally are willing to pay a little more money when they can figure in advance the definite cost of a project, and are relieved of the uncertainty inherent in the "cost plus" method.

Xth OLYMPIAD SALAD



WITH the Olympic Games being held in America this year, we may expect a number of pleasing dishes based upon these contests. A chef in one of the largest California hotels is responsible for a new masterpiece in the realm of salads. In this salad he has featured oranges, calavos and olives, three of the products of his State. This is a main dish salad and with an accompanying bread service and beverage, furnishes an excellently balanced and healthful meal. The salad is arranged as the emblem of the Xth Olympiad, and naturally is very pleasing and novel.

For an individual service, cover a salad plate with shredded lettuce. On this place a 1/2-inch layer of cottage cheese, shaping layer into the outline of a shield. Edge shield with a frame made of segments or half slices of orange turned in alternate directions as shown. The smaller oranges, so plentiful this summer, are just the right size. Make bar of calavo slices across top of shield. On this place circles cut from ripe olives, interlinking these as shown. Strips of pimiento or carrot are placed vertically to make stripes on the lower part of the shield. Serve with any desired dressing or without dressing, as preferred.



PRESERVE your peaches this year. If you are not fortunate enough to own peach trees, see to it that you purchase peaches for preserving, pickling, or turning into a delicious conserve for next Winter and Spring.

Peaches are filled with minerals and salts. The sugar used in preserving them is one of our most valuable quick-energy fuels. If anything else is needed to induce you to put up some peaches, remember the flavor of these preserves and let your conscience be your guide.

Peach Preserves
1 pound peaches
1 cup water
1/2 pound sugar
Put the peaches in a wire basket and dip them in boiling water a few seconds or until the skin slips. Test by raising the fruit out of the water and rubbing the skin between the fingers. Dip the peaches into cold water. Peel and cut the peaches in halves. Boil the sugar and water until the syrup coats a

Peach and Apple Conserve
Use equal parts of peaches and apples, sliced. If the apples are a good color do not peel them. Add three-fourths as much sugar as fruit. Cook the mixture slowly until it is thick and clear. Seal in clean, hot jars.
Sweet Pickled Peaches
7 pounds peaches
5 pounds sugar
2 cups vinegar
1 cup water
3 inches stick cinnamon
cloves
Peel the peaches. Make a syrup of the sugar, vinegar, and water. Add the stick cinnamon. Stick two whole cloves in each peach. Cook a few at a time in the syrup, simmering gently until tender. Put in sterilized fruit jars. Cook the syrup until thick. Remove the cinnamon. Pour boiling hot syrup over peaches. Seal jars tight.
