ONE of my good friends who is an enthusiastic housekeeper, is just back from a prolonged holiday in France, that nation of superlative cooks. Among the clever ideas she picked up during her travels is one which is very simple yet makes a world of difference in her meals. She noticed that vegetables, as served in France, whether in the famous restaurants of the boulevards or in private homes, were invariably tastier and more plump than those she served on her own table.

As a matter of fact, there is nothing really new about this little trick of seasoning. For several years now those of us who follow the culinary trends have been recommending the use of sugar as a seasoning in vegetable cookery. It works wonders with peas, giving them a "fresh from the garden" flavor while squash, which some people avoid because of its lack of individuality, is made surprisingly tasty when sugar is added. This same rule should also be applied to carrots, spinach and other old stand-bys of the vegetable kingdom.

So my suggestion for today, is place a sugar container on the kitchen range along with the salt and pepper shakers where it will be handy when vegetables are being prepared.

HARD TIMES RENEW BANKER'S OPTIMISM

Former Bankers' Chief Finds Much in Past Year to Inspire Confidence in Financial Reliability

ROME C. STEPHENSON, retiring president of the American Bankers Association, declared in an address on the expiration of his term of office that, in travelling about among the banks from one end of the country to the other during the past year, he had "come out of it with a renewed faith in the strength of our banking structure and our banking situation, and a renewed faith particularly in the spirit and courage of the men in the banks that have enabled them to rise unscathed over difficulties such as men never had to face before, or to accept with fortitude misfortunes that were beyond human power to prevent."

When he reflected, he said, that the "entire human economic structure has been brought to the verge of ruin under the difficulties that have swept over not only the nation but the entire world, and that the results of events of this kind react with particular directness upon the stability of our banks, and yet how few have succumbed, we may well renew our confidence in the banks of America; when we think also of how many of our bankers have stood up under the stress and storms of these times and how relatively few of them have been proved wanting in the series of crises that have assailed them, we may well feel a sincere pride in our fellow bankers." He added:

"So I come out of this year of somber experiences not as a pessimist, but as an optimist—as one with a renewed faith and confidence in the spirit of his fellow men under overwhelming difficulties. And particularly do I come out of this year as a banker who is proud of his fellow bankers for the undaunted way in which they have met their part of the great test through which the times have put the nation. I believe that this year has brought new honor to our banking traditions and our banking profession and has won for the banker new title to the faith and trust of all classes of his fellow citizens."

Wise Spending

IN OREGON HOMES

Corvallis—Homemade evaporators are among the latest creations of many Oregon homemakers judging from the demand for directions for making these inexpensive cabinets, trays and boxes. Hundreds of copies of the illustrated leaflet, "Home Drying of Fruits and Vegetables," which is a reprint of a portion of Extens. Bul. 450, "Home Food Preservation," have been distributed free from the home economics office of the extension service. It gives directions for making three dryers, tells how to prepare various fruits and vegetables for the dryer, how to dry the products and how to store them for later use.

Hood River—Salted beans are much preferred to the canned product by Mrs. Thomas Flagg of Hood River. This homemaker passes on her recipe for salting beans. It reads as follows: Prepare two beans as for the table, trimming and cutting or breaking in suitable pieces. Weigh one pound salt to four pounds vegetables and pack in a crock or keg in alternate layers, having salt on top. Put on a heavily weighted board or plate. Leave until the beans are submerged in their own brine, usually about two weeks. Be sure that no beans show above the surface. Remove the weighted board and pour melted paraffin over the surface.

Grass Valley—"My refrigerator," writes an inventive homemaker of Wheeler county, "is a box sunk in the ground in the shade. A wet sack is placed in the bottom and another is spread over the top before the lid is placed. This keeps milk, butter and vegetables cool in the hottest summer days."

Oregon City—"I count at the end of the first two weeks of operation showed that 4196 cans of fruit and vegetables had been preserved in the two county community canning kitchens operated for the benefit of the unemployed. These canning centres, one at Oregon City and one at Milwaukie, are under the supervision of Thelma Gaylord, home demonstration agent, and her assistants, Mrs. E. L. King and Rosemary Gardner.

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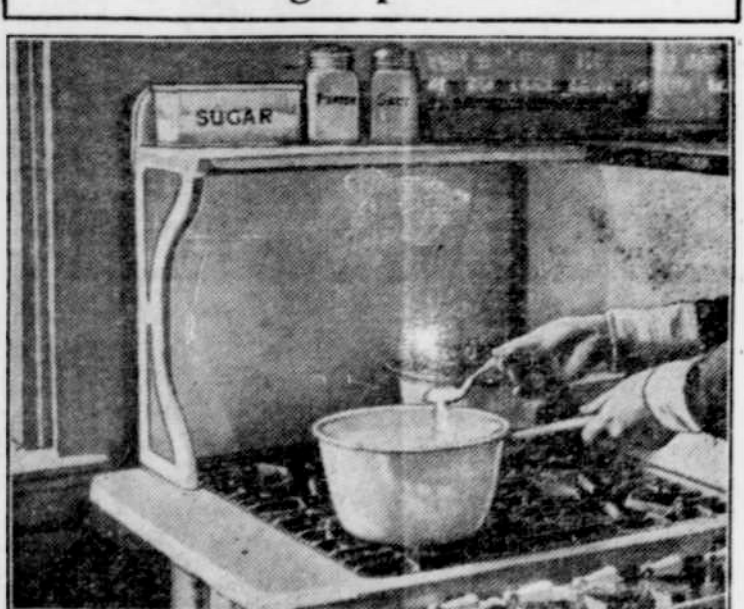
