"I am not a politician, and have no personal ax to grind," says Mr. Seabold. "I don't recall a single candidate ever running for public office in Washington County, who did not make a great many glowing promises as to the large amount of money he would save the taxpayers, and on these promises we have elected and re-elected them to office only to see our taxes soar year after year.

"I am keenly interested in every phase of our county development, commercial, industrial, and agricultural, and to this end we must apply three principles, 'Honest Economy, full co-operation with the taxpayers, and an efficient county government,' eliminating every unnecessary expenditure, which will then produce wholly constructive policies in the interest of all the people of the county."

"The necessity for greater economy in county work, makes it essential that the cost of maintenance be reduced," adds Mr. Seabold, "and with mounting tax delinquencies, unemployment, and low farm prices, the taxpayers are still asked to maintain two engineer's offices, with their work practically paralleling each other. I believe the responsibility of our county road program should rest upon the county court, whom the people elect, and with more co-operation with the taxpayers as to where and how their tax moneys shall be spent.

"It is an undeniable fact that Washington County is far below other counties in receiving its just share of State Highway allotted road funds. If this staggering amount paid out by Washington County residents in the past years, was built into roads at the present time we would have far more and better roads throughout the county, and it would have relieved the now overburdened property taxpayer years ago, to build and maintain his roads."

"It is not my intention," says Mr. Seabold, "to attempt to build myself up in the campaign by disparaging my opponents, but to proceed in a positive way by advocating what seems best for the welfare of the people." Mr. Seabold is also a member of the Grange.
