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4-H Club Members Win Prizes for Corn

Every Animal Taken to
Portland from Here
Wins a Premium

JUDGING TEAMS PLACE

Frances Detrick Wins Fourth On
Her Yearling Heifer

By winning seven places in the Union Stock Yard Special, Washington county 4-H club members made almost a clean sweep in this corn class at the Land Products show at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition held this week in Portland. This class calls for 25 ears of Yellow Dent corn selected from at least one acre of corn grown West of the Cascade mountains and north of Douglas county. Washington county boys won 2nd; 3rd; 4th; 5th; 6th; 7th; and 8th places in this class, in competition with more corn than has been taken to the show in years. The individual winners were Ivan Bierly, second; Elmer Bierly, third; William Vankleek, fourth; Francis Holboke fifth; all of Beaverton Routs 3; Wilson Steele, Sherwood Route 4, sixth, and James Holboke, seventh; and Anna Bierly, eighth, both of Beaverton Routs 3. Francis Holboke also won 5th in the class of 10 ears of Yellow Dent grown west of the Cascades and north of Douglas County. The showing made by corn from Washington County at the Portland show is ample guarantee of the quality of the corn to be seen at the Third Annual Bank Corn Day, sponsored by the Commercial National Bank of Hillsboro, to be held in the bank lobby on Saturday, October 29.

Every animal taken to Portland and exhibited by club members from our county won a premium. Adrian Hornecker, Hillsboro, Rt. 5, won first on a Chester White gilt, and followed this up by placing fourth in swine showmanship. Donald Jossy, Linnton Rt. 2, won third on his Holstein senior yearling heifer, and seventh on his Holstein senior calf; Don also placed third in showmanship. The showmanship contest, as all those will recall who saw the Washington County 4-H fair this year, is judged largely on the ability of the boy to show his calf, with most of the emphasis placed on the fitting of the animal and handling it in the ring. Conformation of the animal is a minor consideration. Competition in this contest has been growing keener year after year.

Frances Detrick, Linnton Rt. 2, won fourth on her yearling Holstein heifer, and placed fourth in the showmanship contest. John Hansen, Portland, Rt. 2 won third on his Brown Swiss heifer and placed third in Brown Swiss showmanship. Earl Jossy, Linnton, Rt. 2, won fifth on his Holstein senior calf.

The Washington County poultry judging team placed third in the poultry judging contest in which teams from several states competed. This team is from the Deerlick Poultry club, the members of the team being Alvin Warren, William Blankenship and Clinton Warren, all Gaston Rt. 1. Alvin Warren was third high man in the contest.

Our rabbit judging team made up of Kenneth Woodward, Hillsboro Rt. 4, Ira Rogers, Orenco, and Leonard Shaw, Hillsboro Rt. 4, placed fourth, with Kenneth Woodward being 4th high man in the contest.

The crops judging team, made up of Vernon Nordin, Sherwood Rt. 3, Scott Haynes, Sherwood Rt. 3, and James Albons, Newberg Rt. 3, placed sixth, with Vernon Nordin tied for 3rd high man in the contest.

The livestock judging team was from the Helvetia-Jackson calf club, the members of the team being Wesley Bachelder, Clarence Tachabold and William Batchelder, all Hillsboro Rt. 1.

Prizes won at the Portland show bring the total Washington County 4-H club fair winning for 1932 well over the \$800.00 mark.
