REPUBLICANS WIN IN WASH. COUNTY

Before the election many would say, "It will be either pretty close or Roosevelt will be elected." It is safe to predict that not one person in a thousand in Beaverton had any idea of the tremendous landslide which elected Roosevelt and gave a majority to the two branches of Congress.

Washington County, however, remained almost entirely in the Republican ranks, the giving a majority to Roosevelt. Those given substantial majorities include Hoss, Zimmerman, Johnson, McAlister and almost the entire county ticket. The two exceptions were Edward Allen for State Representative beat Arthur Ireland, Republican Standard Bearer, and W. W. Boscow won out over E. B. Sappington. Beaverton's two candidates polled considerable votes. James Lewis, the Commissioner-elect, ran far above the average and G. A. Cobb, Democrat for District Attorney was only beaten by his rival G. Russell Morgan, by 312 votes.

Upwards of 1200 votes were polled in Beaverton.
