**ORDERS BEING TAKEN FOR LIMESTONE**

Orders for ground limestone are being accepted at the county agent office. This material may be obtained either from the State lime plant at Salem, or from a plant at Dallas which is now operating. State limestone is the same price as last year, or \$6.25 per ton at the car anywhere in Washington County, except on the Tillamook line where some additional freight is charged. This price is for carload lots, a minimum car being 30 tons.

Applications of limestone in some form is an important part of the program of growing alfalfa in Washington County, says Wm. F. Cyrus, county agent. Lime is not a fertilizer but a corrector of a sour acid condition of the soil. Preceding the planting of the alfalfa the limestone may be applied at any time on the plowed ground and later worked in. On an old piece of alfalfa the lime application is probably best made in the fall or the winter.

**ON OREGON FARMS**

St. Helens-Columbia county home-makers are conducting a real "live at home" program reports Mrs. Sarah V. Case, county home demonstration agent. She says that statistics compiled from 30 families only, one-tenth of all those enrolled in the year round project, show a total of 4,186 cans of vegetables and 7,189 cans of fruit preserved. In addition 574 pounds of fruit and 1,096 pounds of vegetables have been dried. Besides these food supplies available for winter use, approximately 16,075 pounds of fresh vegetables have been stored and more than 30,000 pounds of root vegetables are estimated stored in the ground.

Thinning apples 6 to 7 inches apart rather than merely breaking up the doubles proved better in a comparative test this season in the William Rowland orchard. A check made recently by County Agent Wray Lawrence showed that the tree thinned for greater distance gave a larger total yield, had fewer small sizes, showed less sunburn and limb rub, slightly fewer worms, and the tree showed less effect of drouth.
