Merry Christmas Dishes

ALTHOUGH the main Christmas dinner dishes seldom vary, modern cooks constantly seek surprise recipes so that this dinner of dinners will have a novelty or two. Follow one or more of the suggestions given below and see how pleased your family and guests will be.

Have you made a holiday supply of candied orange and lemon peel? This candied peel is an inexpensive confection which uses citrus fruit rinds that would otherwise be discarded. It is a delicious accompaniment for tea or similar service at any time of the year but it is especially useful now, since it may be used to lend flavor to fruit cakes, plum puddings, Christmas cakes and cookies of all kinds. Strips of the candied peel may be used to decorate Christmas cookies. The candied peel is also a delightful addition to Christmas gift boxes and baskets.

Candied Orange or Lemon Peel Remove peel from 3 oranges (or 4 lemons) in quarters. (The meat of the fruit is, of course, used for fruit cakes, salads, desserts and beverages, which are especially needed to balance the heartier types of foods served at this season of the year.)

Cover peel with water to which 1 teaspoon salt has been added. Roll in final boiling. A little cinnamon, clove or ginger may be added to syrup to vary flavor. Add as whole spices tied in cloth, to prevent darkening in the color of the peel. Another variation is to coat the strips of candied peel with melted dipping chocolate.

Turkey Croquettes 4 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 1/2 cups hot turkey or chicken stock 2 cups cooked turkey, finely chopped

5 cups sifted cake flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 3 eggs, slightly beaten 1 1/2 cups sugar 1 1/2 cups butter or shortening 4 cups (1 1/2 lb.) coconut, shredded Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, soda, spices and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and molasses; then flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time. Beat after each addition until smooth. Bake in greased pan, 2 inches deep, in a moderate oven (350° F.) 50 minutes, or until done. Cut in squares and serve with whip cream.

Deep Dish Banana Dessert 1 pkg. lemon-flavored gelatin 1 pint warm water 3 bananas 1/2 cup cream, whipped 1/2 teaspoon salt Dissolve gelatin in warm water. (There is a new fruit-flavored gelatin that can be made with warm water. Ask your grocer.) Chill. When cold and syrupy, pour half of gelatin into deep glass dish. Slice 2 bananas into this gelatin and fold in carefully. Chill until bowl of cracked ice or ice water and beat with egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Mash remaining banana with a silver fork and fold into whipped gelatin. Fold in whipped cream and salt. Pile onto firm gelatin in dish. Chill. Serves 6.

Cheese Salad in Tomato Cups 1 Pkg. lemon-flavored gelatin 1 1/2 cups warm water 2 teaspoons vinegar 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 Pkg. (3-oz.) Cream cheese 1/4 cup mayonnaise 6 medium tomatoes, peeled Dissolve gelatin in warm water. (There is a new fruit flavored gelatin that can be made with warm water. Ask your grocer.) Add vinegar and salt. Chill. Soften cheese by creaming, adding a small amount of gelatin mixture, if necessary. Add mayonnaise. When gelatin is slightly thickened, add to cheese mixture gradually, stirring inch layer. Chill until firm.

Cut slices from stem end of each tomato. Remove part of pulp. Sprinkle inside of tomatoes with salt and turn upside down to drain. When gelatin is firm, cut in 1/2-inch cubes. Fill tomatoes with gelatin mixture. Arrange on bed of crisp lettuce or water-cress. Serve with additional mayonnaise. Serves 6.

The Cook's Nook

SIX BRAND NEW RECIPES

This pre-holiday season is creating many extra activities. Christmas shopping, unemployment relief work keeping an eagle eye on Junior to see that he wears his rubbers--where there isn't much time for our regular duties at home.

Yet the meals must go on! The lunches, the dinners, the in-between the party spreads. And they must be as interesting and tempting as ever.

For that reason these brand new recipes--they have never been printed before--should appeal to you. Besides introducing novelty and variety to the week's menus, they won't take much of your time or allowance. Just read them over and see if you don't agree.

Crisp Coconut Slices

5 cups sifted cake flour 3 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 3 eggs, slightly beaten 1 1/2 cups sugar 1 1/2 cups butter or shortening 4 cups (1 1/2 lb.) coconut, shredded Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Combine remaining ingredients in order given. Add flour and

mix well. Pack tightly in pan, 8x8x2 inches, lined with wax paper. Cover with waxed paper. Chill overnight or until firm enough to slice. Remove loaf from pan, cut in half, and slice crosswise in 1/4-inch slices. Bake on ungreased baking sheet in hot oven (400° F.) 8 to 10 minutes, or until brown. Makes 7 dozen cookies.

Gingerbread Squares

(1 egg) 2 cups sifted cake flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon soda 3/4 teaspoon ginger 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup sugar 1 egg, well beaten 1/4 cup sour milk 1/3 cup butter or any shortening 2/3 cup molasses Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, soda, spices and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and molasses; then flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time. Beat after each addition until smooth. Bake in greased pan, 2 inches deep, in a moderate oven (350° F.) 50 minutes, or until done. Cut in squares and serve with whip cream.

Hints for Homemakers

To make boiled starch allow a half cupful of the dry starch to a quart of boiling water. First wet the starch with a little cold water, then pour the boiling water on it, stirring all the while. Boil for from thirty minutes to an hour. Then, just before taking it from the fire, stir in a teaspoonful of granulated sugar.

To set the color in gingham, etc., soak the garment for an hour before washing, in a brine of cold water and ordinary table salt. The addition of a tablespoon of powdered alum dissolved in boiling water, is also helpful.

Schooling, harvested 1250 pounds from 1 1/2 acres. This strain of sweet clover is the increase from a single stalk developed at the experiment station, and is the only strain yet found that can be grown successfully in western Oregon. It provides green pastures through the late dry summer period.

Landplaster Applied in Fall LAGRANDE-- Union county farmers have purchased a carload of landplaster for use this fall rather than in the spring. On land too wet for early spring application, better results are obtained here by applying the landplaster in the fall, says County Agent Avery.
