ON OREGON FARMS

ASTORIA—Clatsop county produced nearly twice the amount of dairy feed crops this year as compared to last, judging from the volume of seed sales of the typical crops used by dairymen for this purpose, reports the feed and seed department of the Lower Columbia Dairy cooperative association. Most of the increase was in the crops recommended by the extension service, such as Bortfield turnip, common vetch, Grey oats, rye grass, Schoolman oats, white and red clover, orchard grass and timothy. Records show 360 pounds of Bortfield turnip seed sold compared with 260 last year.

BAKER—Crested Wheat grass continues to hold the spotlight among new forage crops in this county. W. R. Hawley obtained enough seed from a one-acre planting this year to seed an additional 10 to 15 acres, and the grass this fall started well again after the rains came. L. C. Hansen harvested part of a six-acre planting for seed getting 250 pounds. He has seeded 30 additional acres which has started well.

ONTARIO—Gopher poisoning on a district basis has been completed here this fall with many farmers reporting highly satisfactory results as kills have ranged as high as 95 per cent the first time over. Petitions are in circulation to have this district plan extended to other areas next year. The work was carried on with the cooperation of the county court which supplied a revolving fund, and was supervised by the county agent. Landowners paid only the actual cost of covering their own fields, which varied according to the severity of the infestation.

ST. Helens—Three Columbia county strawberry growers have decided to cooperate with the county agent in plant improvement work with the idea of eliminating disease and qualifying for strawberry plant certification, a movement reported popular with many growers in the valley counties.

Oregon State News

Bids have been received for purchased articles of incorporation with the handling of cattle, horses, sheep and land operations.

Bids have been called for grading one and one-tenth miles of section of super-highway from Clackamas River to Oregon City.

Kern and Kibby received the \$24,550. contract for building the second jetty at Reedsport, a the mouth of the Umpqua.

Peck and Co. of Aberdeen, Wash. submitted low bid of \$98,920 on the eight miles of Pendleton-John Day Highway in Grant County.

The double right angle turn at the entrance of the city of Forest Grove on the Baseline road from the east is to be straightened.

The Rogue River Cheeses and Products Co. have established a plant at Central Point with a capacity of 5,000 pounds of cheese daily.

A survey crew of 14 has moved into the city of Forest Grove to locate the connecting line between the Wilson River Road survey and Wolf Creek Road.

Charles Kuntze, owner of the corner on Second Ave. in Tillamook is planning to replace the building on the property with a new \$10,000 structure.
