## Coach Warren Presents Letters And Numerals

Eighteen letters and seven numerals were presented by Coach Warren to members of the football squad at a special assembly last Thursday afternoon.

Before giving out the letters, Mr. Warren reviewed the season record, pointing out that the winning of 5 of the 9 games scheduled was better than had been expected, under the handicap of raw material and a late turn-out. He especially praised the team for their fine team work and spirit in the McMinnville game, which enabled Beaverton to win in the last minute of play by a score of 31-25.
