IN OREGON HOMES

New SPud Outyields Burbank

Hillsboro, Oregon—The new Katahdin potatoes tried out here this year on the A. J. Rowell farm gave a better yield than Burbanks grown in the same field, showing unusual drought resistance, reports County Agent W. F. Cyrus. The drought resistance is the result of a larger root system typical of the variety, he says. The Katahdin is a round potato and thus is not quite as attractive to the general trade, but it is high in quality and may have a distinct place in western Oregon, especially where the long varieties do not always attain desirable size and form.

TILLAMOOK—Bortfeld turnips have replaced grain in the dairy ration on the John Komineth farm from late August through Nov. with no falling off in the milk flow as compared with a year ago. Kimonoth cooperated with County Agent Bergstrom in conducting a fertilizer trial with his root crop this year with the result that on a plot given 400 pounds of sulphur phosphate per acre the yield was 41 tons to the acre, compared with 34 tons on the check plot. This extra seven tons of roots represented a gain of \$17.50 an acre when figured in the equivalent of grain at \$25 a ton.

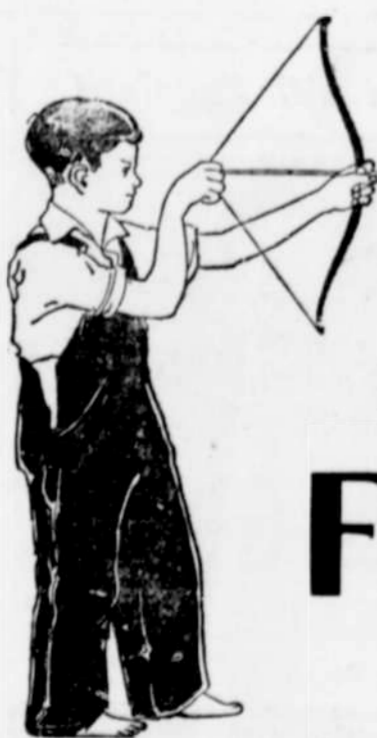
