## HERBERT JONAS, 23 IS A COUNCILMAN

Herbert E. Jonas, 23 of Prineville, thought to be the youngest elective official in Oregon, was elected councilman of the City of Prineville at the November election. He is now serving as assistant sergeant at arms in the House of Representatives of the Oregon Legislature at Salem.

He was born at Wallowa, Oregon, March 18, 1908. He attended public school in Portland, Lagrange and Wallowa and when in the fourth grade entered the Beaverton schools where he spent two years. After one year in the Forest Grove school he returned here and took his 8th grade year in the local schools. In 1922 the family moved to Prineville where the last few weeks of his eighth year were spent and where he attended and graduated from Crook county high school. He then attended the University of Oregon for four years and has since been engaged in the newspaper business with his father at Prineville.

He is the elder son of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Jonas, who from 1918 to 1922 published the Beaverton Times. The family moved to Beaverton from Portland in the fall of 1918 and lived on Watson street. In the year the elder Jonas became principal of the Beaverton high school, succeeding Clarence Phillips that school year and was re-elected serving half of the following year when he resigned to become a partner in the Forest Grove News-Times with the late A. E. Scott. The following year the family returned to Beaverton and built a house on Watson street.

In April 1922 the family moved to Prineville where Jonas became publisher of the Central Oregonian. The elder Jonas is now Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Oregon, Order I.O.O.F.

## BARNES OIL TRUCK IS DAMAGED BY FIRE

About nine o'clock Monday morning one of the H. M. Barnes Oil company's trucks took fire. It was standing in the garage which is a part of their warehouse.

M. E. Underhill, who drives the truck, was doing some work on it when it caught. Mr. Barnes backed his car up to the door of the garage, hooked on a rope and towed the truck out into the open. Then chemical fire extinguishers were used to subdue the flames. Soon the supply of hand extinguisher was exhausted but Beaverton's fire truck arrived and using chemicals put the fire out.

The whole wiring system of the truck was burned and the housing over the timing gears cracked from the heat. Damage will mount to perhaps \$500, covered by insurance.

## PORTLAND SYMPHONY TO PLAY OVERTURE

Portland, Ore.—The next "popular" Sunday afternoon concert to be presented by the Portland Symphony Orchestra is scheduled for January 22, at 3 o'clock, and will feature the Portland school children's chorus of 200 voices.

Appearance of the chorus, which is directed by William Boyer, supervisor of music in the Portland schools is one of the special events of the music season. Not only does the audience have an opportunity to hear these finely-trained young voices, but also to hear some of Bach's lovely works through the emotional and exalted means that is possible only by mass singing.

The "popular" concert, the fifth of the season's series of six Sunday afternoon programs at very low cost will open with the William Tell Overture (Rossini) and close with three Tchaikovsky dance numbers. The latter are "Dance of the Mirliton", "Dance of the Fee Dragee" and the "Waltz of the Flowers," all illustrating the composer in one of his most delightful moods.

Other works to be played January 22 include: Ballet Music from "Sylvia" (Debussy); Symphony No. 7 Andante con moto (Schubert); Walse "Northern Lights" (Allan Lincoln Langley), and Symphony No. 4, Allegro Vivace, "Nutsacker" Suite (Glazounow).

Early indications are that the concert will attract a capacity audience, and that visitors from out of town will attend in large numbers. Many entire families have made reservations. Seats may be ordered direct or by mail through the Symphony box office, J. K. Gill Company, Portland.

## Special Legislative Session Is Reported

First Two Bills Of Importance Provide For Repeal Of Prohibition Act

## SALES TAX VOTED

Very Little Is Accomplished At The Special Session At Salem

The special session of the Legislature at Salem failed to balance the budget as requested by Gov. Meier. The emergency tax on sales of tangible personal property and personal service prepared by the tax commission in the state of Oregon submitted to the legislature without recommendation was passed in the House but defeated in the Senate. Representatives from Washington county were divided in their vote, Representative Johnson opposing the measure and Representative McAlear of Hillsboro favoring the same. It was the general feeling by the members of the legislature that it was impossible to vote a sales tax or any other form of tax until the Ways and Means Committee had determined what the necessities were for the next biennium. Representative Johnson stated he opposed the measure because he did not feel that the people of Washington county desired a sales tax in the form submitted. He further stated that he could not conscientiously vote for any revenue producing measure until the Ways and Means Committee had determined the definite financial condition of the state. Furthermore, the bill as submitted provided for a 2% tax on all sales which would raise between \$2,000,000 and \$5,000,000 which amount is in excess of what is actually needed for the administration of state affairs.

The regular session of the legislature, which opened Monday, Jan. 9th, adopted the same rules as the special session which provided for a 20% cut in the salaries of all employees of the legislature. This was in line with the members of the House. The first two major bills of importance submitted at the opening session were bills submitted by Representative Hall of Portland providing for the repeal of the constitutional amendments relating to prohibition. These bills were referred to the committee on Alcoholic Control of which Representative Johnson is chairman.

## Old Resident Is Called To Great Beyond

Local Man Dies At Five O'clock Saturday Night From Heart Failure

## MANY YEARS HERE

Born In Lund, Sweden, Where He Spent The Days Of His Boyhood

This community was greatly shocked to learn of the sudden death of John Peterson, for many years a resident of this vicinity. Mr. Peterson went to the barn to feed his stock about five o'clock Saturday evening. About two hours later he was found in the barn loft with his head resting on his arm, just as though he had felt sick or faint and had laid down to rest. Heart failure was pronounced the cause of his death.

John Peterson was born at Lund, Sweden, November 11th, 1866, the second of a family of five, two girls and three boys. He finished the public schools in Lund and from there went to Stockholm where he graduated and finished his apprenticeship as cabinet-maker. For a time while there he served in the organization which in this country corresponds with the National Guard. While engaged in the duties pertaining to the army he was chosen twice a year to escort the Commander-in-Chief of the Swedish Army on his trip to Denmark.

When eighteen years of age he came to Minnesota where he met Julius Henrikson and with whom he came to Beaverton in 1887 after working for a time at his trade and later taking up railroading.

For a time after arriving here he made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Anderson at Third and Angel streets. For a time he cut wood and worked at his trade.

December 22, 1892 there was a double wedding at the Hughson home when Peterson married Matilda Hughson and Howard, her oldest brother took unto himself a wife. The Hughson place is now occupied by J. L. Harris and is opposite the H. M. Barnes oil plant. The big bay window where the two couples stood still faces the road.

Five children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Peterson, four girls and one boy; Mrs. Margaret Tallman, Mrs. Anna Barnes, Mrs. Berle Metcalf all of Beaverton, Mrs. Carra Campbell of Union, Oregon and Harold all of whom survive.

In 1898, Mr. Peterson with Wm. Squires departed for the Yukon in search of gold. Mr. Peterson had many adventures in the North, penetrating farther into the interior than most of the gold seekers. His stories of shooting the White Horse rapids and other adventures were always interesting. But he came home without the fortune he sought but by industry, thrift and hard work he was able to get together a considerable sum.

After returning to the States he purchased the Sweeney place just north of Beaverton where he spent the remaining years of his life. As a farmer he specialized in asparagus, garlic and onion seed. For many years he supplied the Portland Seed Co. with onion seed and in 1916 his picture was published in their catalogue. His contract for the 1933 crop has already been signed.

For more than a quarter of a century he was an active member of the local Congregational church and for years he was trustee for that organization. At the time of his death he was a deacon for that church. During the years of his service to the church it has prospered and no small part of the success of the institution is due to Mr. Peterson's zeal.

He is survived by all the children and four grand children, John and Robert Barnes and Ernest and Donald Metcalf, two nieces in New York Mrs. Peterson passed away October 20, 1929.

Mr. Peterson was well and favorably known throughout this region. His loss will be keenly felt by a host of friends and neighbors who deeply mourn his passing.

Funeral services were held at 2 P. M. Tuesday, January 17, from the Congregational church, Rev. Chas. Clarke officiating. Interment was in Crescent Grove. W. E. Pegg in charge of arrangements.
