PRACTICE DEBATE WON FROM CAMAS

Beaverton High School gained its first debate scalp of the new year in a pre-season debate with Camas at Camas, Washington, last Saturday afternoon.

At that time the Beaverton affirmative team, Paul Boeckli and Thelma Tefft, scored a complete victory over the Camas negative speakers, entirely overshadowing in every phase of the debate the comparatively slight opposition offered by the opposing team. At no time was the outcome in doubt.

Thelma Tefft, the second team of the affirmative proved especially versatile in her argument and delivery. This with the brilliant rebuttal speech offered by the affirmative leader, Paul Boeckli showed that without any question the decision belonged to the affirmative.

Unsupported assertions comprised the main part of the negative case. With the exception of one speaker, the Camas team read their speeches which proved a serious detriment when contrasted with the versatility of the Beaverton team.

Some difficulty was encountered upon the arrival of the Beaverton team when it was discovered that the Oregon and Washington order of debate was entirely different.

Camas in accordance with the Washington system, had prepared three negative speakers, each to have a separate rebuttal speech. Beaverton had, as usual, two speakers with one rebuttal. The differences were settled by having two successive negative speakers follow the first affirmative speaker. The one affirmative rebuttal was lengthened to coincide with the two negative rebuttals.

The Camas debate coach acting as judge, gave the decision.
