TOWN COUNCIL HAS SPECIAL MEETING

(Continued from Front Page) when it delivered a little more than 300 G. P. M. The water only lowered in the well about fifty feet.

Following the report of the test Alderman Barnes moved to have three samples of water taken and submitted to three different analysts for examination. After some objection by Mr. Janssen and Alderman Boswell who did not see the necessity for further delay, the motion was seconded and carried when voted on. Boswell and Livermore voting "No" on the proposition. Alderman Fordney then moved that Mr. Bingham be instructed to order the motor for the pump and be ready to install same. The motion to call for bids on the installation of the power line from the Canyon Road to the well also carried. This call is printed in another column.

The installation of the pipe that was torn out on the hill by Weed's Nursery when the new Canyon road was built brought out that the Council were in favor of digging up a part of the old pipe used to bring water from Bull Run and laying about 1700 feet of it to connect the reservoir with the City mains. Alderman Fordney was named as superintendent, or rather, he was placed in charge of the work with authority to go ahead and hire the necessary competent labor to do this work.

SPRAYING PREVENTED BY BAD WEATHER

Weather conditions have prevented spraying peaches for curly leaf and has also delayed somewhat the development of the buds. Growers are now making preparations for getting this application of 6-6-50 Bordeaux onto the trees as soon as the weather is favorable for effective spraying. Thorough application where every bud and twig are covered, of a properly prepared mixture of Bordeaux proves effective in controlling curly leaf. Satisfactory Bordeaux can be made at home and most of the growers follow this practice. Full directions for making this spray may be obtained from the county agent office at Hillsboro. Good commercial Bordeaux is also satisfactory. Where failure to obtain control with this spray occurs the failure is usually due to poor coverage or poor spray.

TO HOLD SHOW FOR COUNTY PRODUCTS

The Washington County Industrial and Inventors Show will be held in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, Hillsboro, Oregon, March 23, 24 and 25.

There will be no admission fee or cost of display space, the exhibits will be confined to products manufactured or made in Washington County.

The show is held for the purpose of giving publicity to the industrial products of Washington County, and also giving any possible inventors an opportunity to display their inventions. Any article, large or small, that is manufactured in Washington County can be exhibited free of charge.

The object of the show is to promote the sale of Washington County products, and possibly assist some invention of merit to establish an industry.

HIGH LIGHTS OF THE 1933 LEGISLATURE

Some auto license reductions bills have been introduced but it is too early to predict the outcome. The sentiment seems to be in favor of a \$5 license.

A bill has been introduced in the senate by a "wet" calling for the convention method of repealing the 18th Amendment.

A bill calling for the managerial form of government in all counties in Oregon found its way into the senate Monday. Adoption of the plan would be optional with the several counties. If and when adopted, the offices of clerk, treasurer, sheriff, coroner, surveyor and commissioners would be abolished and their duties taken over by a non-salaried board of five members who would be authorized to employ a manager as the executive head of the county government, and he in turn would be authorized to employ the necessary assistants.

Ed Schulmerich, of Hillsboro, was a legislative visitor Tuesday.

In a written message from the governor he advocates the seven-point utility program sponsored by Utilities Commissioner Thomas. This bill was introduced Monday.

Mining men from all parts of Oregon were in Salem Saturday to perfect a permanent organization of the scattered units throughout the state. The speakers were enthusiastic over the mining possibilities in Oregon, and favored reestablishment of an active bureau of mines and a school of mines. We naturally wonder if the ladies' auxiliary is made up of the "gold diggers" we hear so much about.

At a farm mortgage meeting on Saturday in Salem the creation of voluntary farm mortgage adjustment committees for Oregon and the respective counties was voted. Advantages derived would be "To act as important impartial arbiters between lenders and borrowers; to exert a beneficial moral effect in 'hard boiled' cases; to bring about reasonable adjustment of indebtedness, and to assist borrowers to obtain refinancing of loans, to a degree at least."

DEBATE TEAM WINS FROM CAMAS, WASH.

Paul Boeckli and Thelma Tefft upheld the affirmative side in their debate with Camas High School last Saturday, on the question, "Resolved that at least half of all state and local revenues should be derived from sources other than tangible property". Spayed Female Dog \$0.50

After March 1st of each year, the penalty is \$1.00 for failure to procure license for the dogs above stated.

Also, after March 1st. of each year, a penalty of \$1.00 attaches to licenses for dogs becoming over 8 months of age after March 1st of each year, and owned or kept over 30 days after March 1st. of each year.

Licenses may be ordered by mail. State the name and address of the person to whom the license is to be issued, and the sex of the dog.
