The first national forest set aside in the state of Oregon was the Cascade range reserve, proclaimed on September 28, 1893, by President Grover Cleveland. The area is now included within the Mount Hood, Santiam, Cascade, Umpqua, and Rogue River national forests.

The first forest set aside in the state of Washington was the Pacific forest reserve, proclaimed by President Benjamin Harrison on February 20, 1893. This area is now included in the Rainier national forest with headquarters at Tacoma.

The name of the Crater national forest was changed by presidential order on July 9, 1932, to the Rogue River national forest. A part of the Rogue River forest was originally set aside on September 28, 1893, and the present unit under the name Crater on July 1, 1908. The present net acreage is 819,186 acres. Its headquarters are at Medford, Oregon.

In 1891, the Congress authorized the President to set aside forest reserves from the timbered portions of the public domain. The first reserve was proclaimed in 1891 by President Benjamin Harrison. On March 4, 1907, the name "forest reserves" was changed to "national forests".

"Rent a Round-the-World Apartment This Winter," Slogan of Hundreds of Expectant Globe-Trotters



There was a good old slogan, "Why Pay Rent When You Can Own a Home?" And now there's a new one "Why Pay Rent When You Can Go Round the World for the Same Money?" Both are good, of course, and there are bargains everywhere, including steamship bargains. One may now circle the globe on a big 42,500-gross-ton liner like the Canadian Pacific's Empress of Britain at about the same expense that would be incurred for rent and meals at home. Only a few years ago a traveler who had gone round the world was an exception; now nearly everybody proves that the world is a globe by leaving New York Dec. 3, for example, going East on the Empress of Britain across the Atlantic Ocean, through the Mediterranean, back across the Pacific Ocean and through the Panama Canal to New York, arriving home April 11, 1933, after a glamorous voyage of 129 days covering 81 ports and places in 23 countries.

The Great Adventure for those who have not experienced it! The Empress, a palace afloat, first touches Madeira where passengers slide down a big mountain on wooden sleds. Then on to Gibraltar, England's famous "Rock"; then to Algiers, Monte Carlo, Corniche Road, La Turbie, Villefranche and Beaulieu, France; next come Naples and Pompeii, Athens where art had its beginnings, the Holy Land and Jerusalem, Bethlehem and all the sacred spots, Fort Said and all the wonders of Egypt, including the Sphinx and the Pyramids, the Nile and the Suez Canal.

comparable Taj Mahal, Ceylon, Sumatra, Java, Singapore, Siam, Manila, China including Kowloon, Hongkong, Repulse Bay, Woosung, Shanghai, Peking—once called Peking—and the Great Wall, are visited. Colorful Japan is next with Beppu, the Inland Sea, Kobe, Kyoto, sacred Nara with its shrines and deer, Yokohama, Tokyo and Kamakura, Honolulu with its famous Waikiki Beach, Hilo and Kilauea Volcano, San Francisco and Los Angeles, the Panama Canal and Havana and a few other highspots, and then—the Statue of Liberty and "Little Old New York" once more.
