Last year Helen Godfrey brought home a certificate for speed.

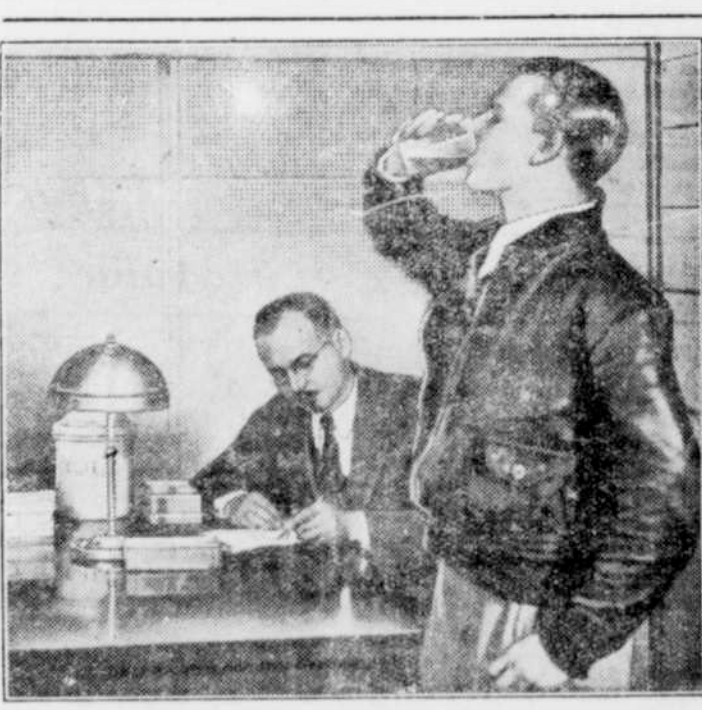

Soda Drinking Stenogs Set Good Example, Colgate Scientists Find

A Real Prohibition "Kick" In Sparkling Fountain Beverages

CLEVELAND, Ohio:—The next time your stenographer slips out in mid-afternoon for a sparkling soda, don't fire her—follow her.

This in substance was the advice handed to business men by Dr. Donald A. Laird, director of Colgate University's Psychological Laboratories in an address before the annual convention of the American Bottlers of Carbonated Beverages Association.

Sodas, in fact all carbonated beverages, Dr. Laird said, pack a real wallop and go a long way toward increasing workpower and efficiency especially in mid-afternoon when muscular tension reaches its peak.

Because of their high sugar content, the beverages have great energy value—sugar being recognized by science as nature's greatest energy food.

Furthermore, Dr. Laird believes that a close parallel can be drawn between the pep and vivacity of the average American and the large amounts of carbonated beverages consumed in this country annually.

In the case of the United States," he said, "we may find some parallel between the general hustle, activity and pep and the increase in the consumption of carbohydrates such as are palatably supplied by most sparkling beverages."

Describing the Colgate tests on which his conclusions were based Dr. Laird said that groups of "human guinea pigs" selected from the student body, were subjected to various forms of fatigue-producing exercise.

Sugar Aids Recovery
Some of these groups were fed drinks sweetened with sugar while others were given drinks flavored with saccharine. The taste is about the same but the saccharine has no energy or food value.

In every case the "guinea pigs" who had the sugar were able to recover from muscular fatigue much more rapidly than the others. Muscular and mental coordination were also benefited by the sugar sweetened drink.

Another discovery which came to light during the investigations was the fact that a sweetened drink taken about one hour after dinner was a definite aid to digestion because it stimulated the flow of gastric juices.
