

ON OREGON FARMS

HOOD RIVER—This county is taking steps to maintain its enviable record in regard to dairy cattle disease, and is now conducting new tuberculosis testing of herds supplying fresh milk, and others desiring such tests. Hood River county now has an accredited raising as T. B. free and a record of having reduced infectious abortion from 12 per cent to about 3 per cent of the herds having a single reactor or suspect.

DALLAS One and a quarter tons of barley, harboring 115 ounces of deadly strychnine alkaloid, has been prepared by county Agent Beck for use of Polk county farmers this spring in combating the troublesome gray digger. Many farmers here have found that earliness applies to more than birds and worms, as it is the early poisoner that gets the diggers.

LAGRANDE—Light feeding of hogs before shipment and other precautions taken by Blue Mountain Livestock association resulted in reducing the shrinkage in shipment from 1 per cent in 1931 to 52 per cent in 1932, reports County Agent Avery, secretary of the group. During the year the association shipped 19 cars of hogs three cars of cattle and 15 cars of sheep.

FORT ROCK Jim Bonnick, a local farmer, has arranged with the County Agent, Mr. Johnson, to try out 10 acres of Ladak alfalfa this spring, certified seed having been obtained from Baker county. Ladak is becoming increasingly popular in a dry land variety as it produces a big first crop while natural moisture is present. Seed of this variety is much in demand now so that it has proved profitable as a seed crop in parts of Oregon where conditions are suitable.

Carlton—Allan Tupper, owner of the "Good-Nuff" farm near here,

is thoroughly sold on Yamhill county as a dairy region. Tupper's herd of 19 pure-bred Jerseys has led the local herd improvement association for the last two years. For the year ending last October his herd averaged 465.6 pounds of butterfat per cow. Practically all his feed is produced at home, thus keeping costs low. In 1932 his records show that for each dollar spent for feed he realized \$3.25 for dairy products. Only high producing cows and home-grown feed enable him to show any profit under present price conditions, he says.

Heppner—Testing of blight resistant vegetables is one of the projects adopted by the Rhea Creek grange for the coming year, reports County Agent Smith, who has been assisting the granges at Lexington, Boardman, Willows, Irrigon and Rhea Creek to line up their programs for the year. Mrs. F. Parker and Ben Anderson have agreed to try out blight resistant squash recommended by the Hermiston branch experiment station, and Mrs. Parker will also try the Burtner Blightless beans, said to withstand both blight and drought. Each grange has 10 projects listed for the coming year.

Hood River—Three years of careful testing on the local experiment station farm has shown the practicability of home-prepared oil sprays which are said to cut the cost of such spray materials in two for the orchardist. Full directions for making or preparing these sprays have been included in a new Station Circular No. 107 entitled "Oil Spray Recommendations," now available at the experiment station or direct by free distribution either at the local Corvallis, says Leroy Childs, Hood River station superintendent. The new bulletin also contains a condensed list of latest recommendations regarding use of either dormant or summer oil sprays as determined by the Western Cooperative Oil Spray project of which the Oregon station is a member.
