FORM UNEMPLOYED ORGANIZATION SOON

A public meeting to discuss the advisability of issuing script is scheduled to be held at the Beaverton high school Thursday evening March 23. Mr. Colter of Portland will be the principal speaker.

A local resident who is interested in getting the matter before the public has handed us the following communication which we reproduce in full.

For the purpose of adequately meeting the needs of our local people, an organization, headed by G. F. Gordon, elected as president, has been launched to work out details and plans for the establishment of headquarters to take care of the products of the farms and supply farmers with the labor of those who would otherwise be unemployed.

The plan is to give the producer wholesale price, and sell to the members of the organization at a great saving. All products of the farm will be handled and distributed. Script will be issued which may be used as legal tender within the organization. Men will be paid at the rate of 50¢ an hour for a six-hour day, five days a week and will receive script for their services. It is hoped that this system will fully and adequately meet the needs of our local community and take care of the welfare work that under the present system is charity.

Every honest and industrious individual is willing and anxious to render service equal to the amount of goods they may receive. This is impossible in times of depression when greedy men hide away in cold vaults, millions of dollars that should be in circulation. This is an emergency measure and when fully understood, will command the respect and attention of every fair minded citizen.

This will in no wise interfere with the local merchant; for he, too, may use script to purchase at wholesale the produce from our storehouse. The stamp system will be used upon which the spender will place a stamp amounting in value to two cents. The merchant accepting this script will affix a two cents stamp to the certificate. On a dollar purchase, this will amount to a 2% discount for cash. In addition to his regular cash trade, he will
