Are You Insured?



Salem, Oregon, March 14th.

State Insurance Commissioner A. H. Averill has again issued to the Oregon public a warning to be on its guard with reference to the solicitation of insurance of any kind or form by unknown companies or individuals not licensed nor authorized to transact an insurance business under the Oregon laws and under state supervision.

Mr. Averill says: "This solicitation is being made through the mail and by various other methods and in spite of the repeated warnings issued by the insurance department the public is being misled through attractive letters and flattering descriptions of the merits and generosity of their respective "special" policies, and innocent and unsuspecting citizens are parting with their hard-earned money for supposed insurance protection where the chief selling argument is the initial low cost."

Such coverage, Mr. Averill points out, is usually expensive at any price. The terms are so vague and misleading as to make it difficult, if not impossible, to collect for death, sickness or accident, and in case of denial of liability, which often follows when claim for indemnity is made, it is found that the companies are outside the jurisdiction of the Oregon courts and to attempt to collect in courts of their home state is impracticable because of the high expense of doing so.

Oregon citizens, before being misled by non-admitted companies, should make inquiry of the insurance departments or of one of their local insurance agencies and be sure that the insurance purchased gives them the protection they desire.

The Beaverton insurance agents take this method of presenting to the people of this community the above letter from the insurance department of the state.
