He came to Oregon sometime in 1910 or 1912 and for a time made his home with the priests at Verboort. At the time L. Farnsworth now associated Press correspondent at Paris, was publishing The Banks Herald which later was merged

with the Beaverton Review. While at Verboort, Boyd, as he was known locally helped get out a church paper with Father Le Miller, a priest known far and wide for his good works. This paper was printed on the press of the Banks Herald.

Coming to Beaverton he entered the employment of Otto Erickson & Co. and has been associated with that concern almost from that time. The interval when he was doing other work was when together with the present owner, he helped start The Beaverton Review. After severing his connection with The Review he reported for the Portland Telegram and later for the Portland Journal.

One of his last requests was that Mrs. Erickson have his body placed in a family burying ground at San Francisco, claiming that he had papers in his room that would tell who his people were. The writer and Mr. Erickson after a thorough search of his belongings came to the conclusion that what papers were found were of little value in establishing his relationship. The funeral will be held today, Friday, under the direction of Rev. Father O'Neil and interment in the Catholic cemetery near Cedar Mill. Arrangements are in charge of W. E. Pegg.

Mrs. Raleigh Robinson passed away at her home on the Scholls road Thursday March 23 at the age of 69 years. Although an invalid for many years her death was a shock to her many friends. Mrs. Robinson was one of the early pioneers of Oregon having come there from her home in Kansas when a young girl. She and Mr. Robinson were married fifty years ago, Oct. 12 and have resided all those years on their farm here.

She is survived by her husband, Raleigh Robinson and one son, Harry Robinson at home, one daughter, Mrs. Ora Sylvester of Halsey, Oregon, four grand-daughters and two grand sons. Also one sister in Portland and one in California.
