Open House At Grade School Is A Success

Large Turnout For Track Practice Shows School's Enthusiasm

WORK IS OF INTEREST

Fourth Grade Pupils Are Striving For Perfect Spelling Grades

The first track practice of the season was held Monday, with about seventy boys and girls turning out. Although this is an unusually large number, not many jetties or experienced athletes were present. However, with the enthusiasm that was shown, Beaverton should again be well represented this year.

The track and jumping pits are in better shape than ever this year. Boys practice will be on Monday and Wednesday and girls on Tuesday and Thursday.

Beaverton is going out with a vengeance this year, as last year was the first year since the County Grade School Track Tournament has been in existence that we have not won first place.

The "crops" map project won first place in the seventh grade project contest. The students who made winning maps were Lyman Webb, Louis Ruckel, Alfred Galoway and Carl Lierman.

Nine pupils in the fourth grade learned their spelling lessons so well each week they earned a grade of one on the first day of their monthly spelling review. Among the nine were, Hallie Jean Pace, David McCann, George Gordon, and Agnes Wegener who missed no words. The class has set a goal of twenty perfect papers and no grade below two to be reached by Friday.

The bird house building contest is in full swing in the sixth grade room. Nine bird-houses arrived, and more are expected soon.

The fifth grade is now visiting various possessions of the United States. They recently returned from the Philippine Islands and are planning to visit Panama Canal Zone next.

During the next three weeks the fifth grade arithmetic class will attempt to increase speed and accuracy in working fractions.

The first grade children have made poem booklets, which contain a printed copy of each poem they have learned throughout the year, and a freehand illustration of their interpretation of the poem.

Barbara Miller taught the children the following appropriate verse this week.

Little deeds, like little seeds,
Grow and grow and grow.
Some are flowers, some are weeds
Giving joy or woe.
Let us sow the happy deeds,
Everywhere we go.

The following account of the parents' day held last week is the work of two eighth grade students, Marian Metzler and Russel Hulet.

A very interesting display of school work was viewed at the Grade School Open House Day, last Friday afternoon. During the first half hour, lessons were heard in each room. This was followed by a brief entertainment of plays or music, after which pupils and visitors roamed at will over the building.

One very interesting and novel feature was the maps made by the seventh grade students. Included in these were produce, meat, surface and mineral maps.

There were on display in the sixth, seventh and eighth grade rooms, Palmer Writing Certificates earned during the year.

The soap carving was one of the main centers of interest. The work showed much originality. A fire-place, rabbits, lion and bear were some of the most interesting figures. This work was done by the upper grades.

All rooms were attractively decorated, with work done by pupils in regular classes.

Everyone went home feeling that the Open House was a great success.

The City Council Has Regular Session

Councilmen Livermore And Barnes Vote "No" On Appointment

EXCEPTION TAKEN

Many Bills Are Brought Up For Discussion And Passed

Councilman Barnes and Livermore stuck to their guns and voted "no" once more when at the regular meeting of the City Council, the Mayor repeated his appointment of V. P. Reimer. Here-to-fore when the question came up Rosewell and Bishop had voted against them.

Bills allowed included one for \$37.50 from A. F. Flegel who handled the legal work on the city vs. Stipe case last week. F. Noyes' bill for connecting up the city mains with West Slope so as to get water down here at once, Noyes' bill for material aggregated almost \$230 Reimer's bill for \$105. for writing an ordinance and handling the Stephenson vs. Beaverton and the MacKenzie vs. Beaverton cases involving city liens on property sold on tax titles. \$14.50 for painting signs was also allowed.

An ordinance drawn by attorney Reimer attempting to regulate collection of garbage was read three times and passed with an emergency clause and incorporated in the enacting clause was "The people of the Town of Beaverton do ordain." J. H. Hulet, one of the spectators, inquired whether those assembled thought they were the people of the Town of Beaverton. Attorney Reimer replied that the charter required the ordinance to begin that way and Hulet came back that laws of State of Oregon required ordinances to begin "The Common Council of the " and has no mention of the people.

The matter of cutting of hay on certain property bid in by the Town on street assessments was brought up by a communication from Alex Bronkey but was tabled.

Hulet presented the matter "but he had been denied the minutes of the former council meetings on the ground that they had not been approved" but no action was taken though Fredrick Koshland made a few personal remarks not at all concerning any matter then or at any time before the Council.

HIGH SCHOOLS ARE TO BE GIVEN ZONES

The recent change in the law for creating a non-high school district in each county requires election of five board members on the third Monday in June. This board will contract with the high schools for cost of educating students and determining amount to be paid for transportation.

O. B. Kraus is zoning the county. When this is completed districts not now in a high school district will be advised of said zoning.
