BEAVERTON TEAM UPHOLDS NEGATIVE

The Beaverton negative team went to Seaside, April 8th, to meet Seaside in a debate which decided the Northwest-Oregon championship. As usual, Beaverton won with flying colors. Our team is now champion over five counties.

Bus number 4 made the journey, filled to the limit. Almost the entire Public Speaking Class went with the team. A few who were not in the class also made the trip. Some went in swimming, while others turned to the more "exciting" diversion of digging clams, or "guzzling hot dogs". After so strenuous a day almost everyone was asleep on the way home. Of course this excludes a few who were otherwise occupied including: Ivan Bierly, Margaret Dickman, Don Walker and many who have requested their names be omitted. They include: Kenneth Taylor, Betty Stickney and Charlotte Patterson. But taking the trip as a whole, it will not be forgotten for quite some time by those who attended.

MANY GO TO SEASIDE FOR DEBATE

In a tense and exciting hour-and-a-quarter debate, Beaverton High again won—this time at Seaside. After a long trip down and a lunch on the beach last Saturday the team, Ivan Bierly and Kenneth Taylor and the public speaking class went to Seaside High School where the debate was held. Beaverton furnished at least half of the audience and much thanks is due the school board for permission to use the bus.

The question: Resolved, that at least half of all state and local revenue should be derived from sources other than tangible property, was ably debated by our negative debate team.

The affirmative (Seaside's team) gave, in support of the question three main arguments, that present conditions make a change necessary, that the change they propose (intangible taxes) is a desirable form of taxation, and that it will work. Our team, in reply, showed that the present conditions are an outside force which cannot be blamed on the present tax system. This killed the affirmative first point.

Seaside gave as their argument for the second point the desirability of a change. The present system was undesirable because of the existing condition of affairs. The negative replied by showing that this argument was the same as the first and had already been taken care of.

The third argument, the new plan, was a recommendation that an income and sales tax be put into effect. The negative had figures to show that these two taxes could not raise 50% of the taxes in Oregon.

Many other minor arguments and sub-points were also given by both sides and were set forth with much eloquence and persuasion.

The critic judge then gave the audience waited in a tense, nerve-tension upon five points while the vious silence. The first point went to "the negative (Beaverton), the second to the affirmatives. Then the judge said the decision hinged on the third point and that he would leave that to the last. At this announcement the audience became still more quiet. The fourth went to the affirmative and the fifth to the negative. The judge started to give the third point, then paused to give one more criticism before the final decision. The listeners sat waiting tensely and the judge finally gave the decision—Negative! —Douglas Taylor
