West Slope Residents, Indignantly Protest To City Officials

HOUSEWIVES' IRATE

Beaverton Water Is Turned Into Mains By W S Water Supt

"The Water Question", which has lain dormant for some time has suddenly assumed amazing proportions. We have reported from time to time the development of the city well, from the time the contract was let last fall until until recently. Everybody has been anxiously waiting the time when the water should be turned into the city mains and Beaverton would really be using its own water.

Saturday Henry Dahl, superintendent of the West Slope water district, acting under or rather with the consent of the West Slope water commissioners, turned the Beaverton city water into the mains of the West Slope district. Some time later one of the West Slope residents is said to have approached Mayor Fisher, Recorder Smith, water superintendent Goyt and others of the city government and they declared emphatically that they knew nothing of the West Slope water.

However, it has developed that Dahl, with the consent of H. E. Weed, one of the West Slope commissioners and we believe of others had turned the well water into the West Slope mains. It would seem strange that these men would turn Beaverton's water into their mains without some of the Beaverton city officials at least giving them the authority.

The user first noticing the water in the West Slope mains being different said that he liked tea and that he could not drink the tea that morning.

Inquiries began to come in to the West Slope authorities early on Monday and judging from some of the stories one hears some of those telephone lines must have been near the melting point.

For fear that we would not print just what we were told to print, we suppose, we can hardly conceive of for any other reason, news did not get to the Review until some days later. However, a representative from this paper interviewed some of the residents of Westdale, Kennedy Acres, Woodland Acres, West Slope and other sections being served from the line which was filled with the water from the Beaverton well.

No names will be used although some of the ladies interviewed said, "Go ahead and use my name, if you want to. I'll tell anyone what it is like if they ask me. I was in Beaverton yesterday but no one asked me."

The first one said, in part, "I would not want to have that kind of water. They said it was soft! If they turn it in again I'll go out with a petition to recall the whole bunch of them. We have a well in our yard; if we want hard water we'll use our own."

The next one was a man. "We have our own water system but I'll say there was something doing around here Monday."

The next, a lady, "Is that well water? I just thought so. I don't like it. No suds."

Still another, "I'd haul water before I'd pay for that. Why, the price we pay for water, I think is terrible. By the time you'd bought special soap and something to break the water, you'd pay double the first cost."

The next one, "I put soap in the water in the boiler and put it on the stove Monday. When I took the lid off it looked like buttermilk."

Another lady, the last one interviewed, "We do not use the West Slope water but you should have been here Monday. You'd heard enough."

Mr. Dahl was in town soon after we returned. "I don't see what the matter. The government passed it as safe. It grade's 'A'." Those women had no business to raise such a rumpus. I don't know how it leaked out. Not a soul knew of it's being turned into our mains. Then he went on to tell how a certain doctor had told him that we needed more minerals in the water. That the pure, sparkling soft water from our springs wasn't healthy.

Just as an after thought. Maybe we do need minerals in our water. Crazy Crystals Co. is making a fortune out of mineral water. We would not like to infringe on

Wilfred Grossen of Hillsboro Rt. 1 and the son of Mr. and Mrs. P. F. Grossen has completed six years in 4-H club work.

Wilfred Grossen received his scholarship from the Oregon state fair board for placing second in the yearling divisions of the Brown Swiss. This will be Wilfred's second time at summer school.

Earl Jossy received his scholarship from Oregon State fair board for being on the outstanding crops judging contest. Earl placed second highest in the state. This will be Earl's third time at summer school.

Frances Detrick received her scholarship from the Oregon state fair board for winning first in the yearling Holstein class. This will be her fourth year at the summer school.

Raymond Wismer received his scholarship from the Washington county Guernsey Breeders association for being the outstanding Guernsey club member in Washington Co. This will be his first year at summer school.

GOVERNMENT PLANS FOR REFORESTATION

At the meeting of the various County committees in the Court House in Portland on Thursday, April 20th., Raymond B. Wilcox outlined the program for the Government Reforestation Work.

Washington County's quota will be sixty-two men. These men are to be 18 to 25 years of age inclusive and should be men who have dependants. They are to be drawn from the regular unemployment registration files of Washington County and the first sixty-two men registered who qualify as to age and as to their necessity for unemployment will be taken.

The men will be required to enroll for a period of six months but if at any time during this six months they should secure employment elsewhere or should their health break down they will be released from their enrollment. Any men accepting this work will be obliged to assign the larger part of his wages to dependant relatives.

The men will receive their food clothing and room and \$30.00 per month and of the \$30.00 per month it is expected that they will be required to assign \$24.00 to dependants.

The men who are chosen by the County Relief Committee will be sent to Portland and enrolled by the United States Army in the Civilian Conservation Corp. and will receive a physical examination by an Army physician. Upon acceptance they will be ordered to Vancouver Barracks or to Fort Stevens for preliminary training and they will be equipped with clothing of a uniform type.

At the completion of this preliminary training they will be sent to camps in the National Forests, National Parks or State Forests where they will remain for a period of six months. Each of these forest camps will have a personnel of 215 men under the command of three Army officers. Each of these camps will be self operating with its own cooks and equipment. The wages of the men, the purchase of equipment and of food, and supplies will all be under the direction of the United States Army.

At the present time there are 500 young men registered in Washington County most of whom are eligible for this work. Inasmuch as Washington County's quota is but sixty-two men it is inevitable that there will be many disappointments but the County Committee expects to choose the County quota from the first sixty-two men registered who need the work and who have relatives dependant upon them.
